Whereas statements made by the chief medical inspector of the board of education, reflecting on the intelligence and good sense of the women teachers' of Toronto, have appeared in the Toronto papers, the Women Teachers' Association submits the following for your consideration:

1. In our opinion the chief medical inspector is not yet sufficiently conversant with conditions in the public schools to make a general statement, as in many schools he has made only one official visit—no class room being inspected.

DREAMS OF THE BLIND.

Curious data have been gathered abroad with reference to the dreams of the blind. It appears that all dreams of normal ons are sight dreams and that dream is spoken of as a vision. If the blind have not been born so, it is said they may remember enough of what they have seen to enable them to imagine how things look, and when the

imagination has free play in sleep, to picture themselves as in full possession of the sense of sight.

Physiologists would explain this by saying that during the years in which the subjects possessed the sense of sight a certain part of the brain had educated to receive and interpret all these messages which the eye sends, and that when this part of the brain acts spontaneously in sleep the

of some two hundred blind persons of both sexes who were questioned it was found that those who became blind before their fifth year mever dreamed of seeing. Of those whose sight was lost between the fifth and the seventh year some did and some did not see in their dreams, while all whose eyesight was lost after the seventh year had quite as vivid dream visions as normally endowed persons. The fifth to the seventh year is thus shown to be the critical period. This period corresponds with the age which authorities assign as the limit at which a child becoming deaf will also become dumb, and also with the age of one's earliest continuous mem-

ory of onself.
It is interes is interesting to note that blind persons dream quite as frequently as normal people, and that, with those who do not see in their dreams, hearing plays the principal part. When dreaming of home, for instance, they will hear the voices of relatives, and perhaps will feel the familiar objects in the household.

OUTWITTING THE WILY COYOTE IN TEXAS.

How to get rid of coyotes and wolves Southwest Texas has been a question that has puzzled stockmen in that section for years. While the animals are trapped and shot in large numbers each year, their complete extermination has been impossible. A new and successful method of destroying them, however, has recently been adopted by A. C. Lorden, who has a ranch in Starr County. Mr. Lorden has made a study of the wfly coyote and wolf and was aware of the fact that these animals will seldom touch poisoned meat found above ground. Neither will they take meat from a trap unless desperately hungry. Altho they are known to be specially fond of tender kid meat, at is seldom that a choice bit of this morse will tempt them when it has been pois-

The ranchman ordered that the fresh carcass of a kid be soaked in parts green. When this was done, he tied a rope to it, and, tying one end to his saddle, he dragged the kid thru the chaparral for several miles, finally burying it in the earth to a depth of about two feet, firmly tamping the ground over it.

A visit to the spot next morning revealed nine dead coyotes and wolves, Since then more than 200 coyotes and thirty-odd wolves have been put out of existence upon the Lorden ranch by this method of poisoning them. Other ranchmen are adopting it, and it is believed that these wild ani-mal pests will be exterminated within the next few years in that part of the Texas ranch region.
