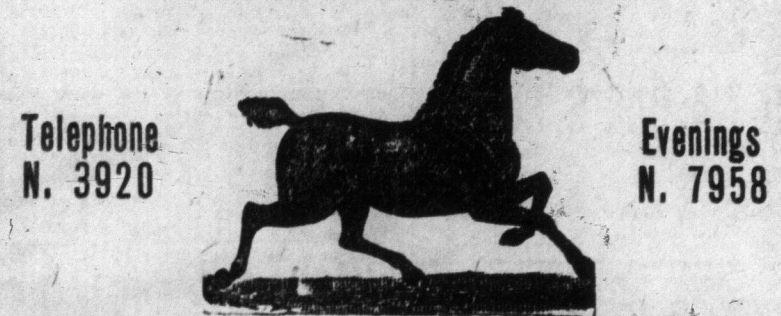

Dunn has found time to get a club together, which is almost the pick of the league, but then it is not unusual for him to coral all the promising material, in fact, the sales from that club to the majors each season is considerable. Shannon appears to be living up to his home-town reputation, as he walked out on one Thursday with two out, but that is said to be a daily trick of his, so that the fans in Baltimore would have no reason to be surprised if he knocked out one every time he goes up. The rest of Dunn's line-up may be relied upon to "give" their opponents so.

His association with major and minor leagues has broadened his outlook, and he has gained the reputation of being one of the best "fixers" for making money in the business. You may rely upon it, Arthur Irwin has his club dated for exhibition games on every available date. This is one of the surest methods of making money, and one at which he excels.
