
DISORDERS AT LUBECK.

KINGSTON SUGGESTED AS SCENE OF TRIAL FOR STRIKE LEADERS

Winnipeg, June 17.—Twelve hours after they had been placed in cells within the confines of Stony Mountain Penitentiary on a series of charges of sedition and conspiracy against the government of Canada, ten Winnipeg strike leaders appeared before a justice of the peace this afternoon and were remanded for eight days. They will come up again on Wednesday, June 23.

TO ASK BAIL
