WHY GERMANY CAME ROUND. London Papers Say the Reason of the Emperor's Change is a Business One.

London, Nov. 13 .- The afternoon news papers, commenting on Emperor William's approaching visit to England and the improved relations between Germany and Great Britain, voices the general opinio here, saying the "latter is in a great part due to the vast change in the relations between the United States and Great Britain which preceded it, and from which Germany has drawn the obvious deductions that le-gitimate colonial and commercial ambitious cannot possibly be fulfilled in the face of the hostility of the two English-speaking

peoples."
According to The St. James' Gazette, with the establishment of good relations between London and Washington, it became necessary for Germany, to stand on friendly terms with both. There has been, the paper adds, no unqualified promises of future armed support, but the three countries have decided to live on civil terms for business rea-
