

MINING IN ROSSLAND CAMP

Development as it Progresses in Numerous Properties—War Eagle—Centre Star.

MINING EXCHANGE OFFICERS

Ald. Cox is President—Other Officers—Sales of Stocks on the Board.

The Amalgamated Toronto Mining Exchange yesterday morning elected the following officers: President, R. S. Cox; vice-president, F. G. Morley; secretary, J. J. Barr; treasurer, J. J. Barr; executive committee, J. L. Mitchell, J. H. Ross, W. H. Bessell, W. J. Palmer, Gary Parker, M. D. Boyd, W. J. Palmer, A. J. Barr and J. Yankoughst.

It was decided to discontinue the Saturday sessions, commencing with the coming Saturday, until September. Hereafter the daily afternoon session will commence at 3 o'clock.

Progress in Rossland. Following is from the Rossland Miner's weekly review of the Rossland camp.

One of the features of the week was the finding of two and a half feet of ore on the 200-foot level of the Jose, which assays eight ounces in gold to the ton.

Another was the finding of one of those very rich pockets of free gold ore in the I. X. L. The ore carries masses of free gold, and some of the very high assays are in the opinion of some experts that the I. X. L. at depth, will prove a bonanza mine; in other words, it is thought that some very large shows of high grade ore should be found in this mine at a depth of from 500 to 1000 feet.

In a prospect in the fifth level of the Columbia and Kootenay a body of four feet of talc ore has been encountered. The farther was not yet reached.

The output of the camp is still confined to the Le Roi. The other mines are not yet to catch up with the development work, although some stopping is going on in both mines. By the end of August, if all goes well, these mines should be in a position to rejoin the ranks of the producing mines and swell the total output to a very considerable degree.

These, the Jose and No. 1 and the Nickel Plate, with the possible addition of the Columbia-Kootenay, will then be ready to join or will have already joined the big shipper's camp. The Le Roi has again broken its own record for shipments, and this week puts out an estimated total of 4324 tons. This is an advance on the previous record of 417 tons.

The Eagle—the bottom of the big shaft is 320 feet below the collar of the shaft. This is the new development level of the mine. A lateral drift is being run east-west between the shaft and the main level of the shaft. This will be completed by the end of the month, and will take up the heading east and west on each vein. This will be done with four sets of contracts at work, open up the new level rapidly, and if commensurate underpinning is performed on the upper level, the War Eagle should have regained the proper amount of development in about a couple of months. On the sixth level there is some stopping in progress, also, and it is being made on the level north vein is being drifted upon to the east and the south vein is being worked on the level above. The level above the fifth level, with a drift in it, is in progress on the level above. The level above the fourth level and the fourth level will be taken up as the timbering progresses, and will be completely blocked out within a couple of days. Plans are under consideration for the shaft to be extended to the level above, which, when accepted, will be followed by the line being placed, accordingly in touch with the requirements of the mine.

Centre Star—Work on the surface is proceeding along slowly, the construction of the timber ways, shafts, hoists, etc., is still in progress. As soon as this is completed in a few weeks, with the exception of the compressor, part of which, however, said to be on the way, will be completed within a week or ten days. At the same time it is the intention to drift both ways to the station, which is on the ledge. The depth of the level is 425 feet from the collar of the shaft. A plan is being made on the level parallel to the side line of the iron main. The big step on this level is being worked, and the shaft is being taken out as the timbering progresses, and will be completely blocked out within a couple of days. Plans are under consideration for the shaft to be extended to the level above, which, when accepted, will be followed by the line being placed, accordingly in touch with the requirements of the mine.

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COLONIES SHOULD CHIEF

For Their Own Defence, Said Lord Selborne to the Chambers of Commerce.

TORONTO PROPOSAL SHELVED.

London, June 26.—The fourth congress of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom opened here this morning. Between 300 and 400 delegates, representing the colonies as well as Great Britain, were present. Lord Selborne, home secretary, was the guest of honor, and welcomed the delegates. In the course of his speech he announced that real progress had been made towards laying a Pacific cable and that tenders would be invited immediately for the beginning of the work.

He is seventh ruler of Egypt in the line of Mehmet Ali, and the second Abbas.
