GOOD QUESTION NOT SETTLED YET FURTHER LITIGATION NOW PROBABLE

A DOUBT AND AN INTERRUPTION.

Enforcement Would Make Manitoba a Nation of Importers, Says Mr. Phippen.

PREMIER PUTS ONUS ON LEGISLATURE

Intimates That Cabinet Will Not Put Prohibition Law Into Force.

Winnipeg, Dec. 3.—Mr. Phippen, counsel for the liquor men before the Imperial Privy Council, in an interview to-day said: "The view of the Judicial Committee does not appear to differ materially from that of the Court of King's Bench, excepting as to the effect to be given to Section 119. The Judicial Committee appears to hold that this section limits and governs the extra-provincial effect of the other sections of the act, that when we find something apparently prohibited by the act, which is beyond the power of provincial limitation, we must read that prohibition out of the act by reason of the construction to be placed upon Section 119. In other words, the Court of King's Bench, under the construction placed upon Section 119, thought the act had an extra-provincial effect and was therefore ultra vires. The Judicial Committee, placing a different construction on Section 119, is of the opinion that the act cannot affect inter-provincial transactions, but is limited strictly to transactions within the province, and is, therefore, within the power of the Provincial Legislature."

PREMIER ROBLIN TALKS

Intimates That He Will Put Onus of Enforcement on Legislature.

Premier Roblin of Manitoba was asked yesterday for an opinion concerning the full text of the judgment of the Privy Council in the liquor law appeal. He replied that the published report showed the cabinet favored the ground and established the right of the province to pass prohibitory legislation.
