FAILURE OF THE CONFERENCE.
The latest cable dispatch is to the effect that nothing definite will result from the Imperial conference. With the exception of the establishment of an Anglo-Canadian steamship service, the failure of the conference, in a large measure, at any rate, to the indifference to the standpoint of the Canadian representatives. They place the responsibility for the failure on the shoulders of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He does not understand the position that the colonies occupy, and particularly in relation to the Empire, at this momentous juncture in the history of Greater Britain. Where, let us ask, would the United Kingdom stand today if deprived of her colonies? Great Britain and Ireland are merely a speck on the surface of the deep. If they stood alone and had to rely upon their own internal resources, they would, ere this, have dropped to the rank of a second-rate power. If Morgan and the Yankees had to deal with Great Britain alone, they would tangle the island all up in a month. Without years they would convert the little kingdom into ancient history. Great Britain is a country whose resources are nearing exhaustion. If the British Empire has a future, and we believe it has a glorious future, it is thru and by means of the colonies. The great future is to be realized. Great Britain glories in her past. Canada reveals in her future. For the future is hers. There was no occasion for the Canadian Premier to assume the role of the poor relative at the family reunion. Canada is son and heir in the great family of the British Empire. A representative should have realized the importance and dignity of his position. Canada's Premier should have gone to London and sounded one clear call. Instead of that, there has been a dismal monotonous hum of the same old notes. Needs just now is some leader to declare in clear tones in favor of the policy that has created such great empires as Germany and the United States. Canada believes in the policy that has proved such a signal success in the United States. It is her misfortune to be represented at the present time by a man who is out of harmony with the spirit that dominates the leaders in business, finance and industry in this country. The colonial conference would certainly not have failed in its object if the Canadian Premier had grasped the significance of the Canadian position. We hold the key of the situation. If the Canadian Premier had sounded one clear call, and had awakened the slumbering statesmen of Great Britain to the importance of doing something to develop the united resources of the Empire, the conference would not end so ingloriously as it now seems destined to do. Canada has more and greater possibilities for the future expansion of the empire than any other portion of Greater Britain. It is with Canada and with the wonderful possibilities of Canada that the Imperial Conference should have been chiefly concerned. If the empire is to increase in population, and it must so increase to keep pace with the needs of the world, the increase must be in the colonies, and principally in Canada, the star colony. If the empire is to be made self-supporting, it is Canada that must produce the necessary wheat and beef. To build an empire you must legislate for the future. To build the British Empire, you must legislate principally for that portion of it with which its future is identified. In short, to build up a great British empire you absolutely must legislate for Canada. This is the one clear call that Premier Laurier should have sounded at the Imperial conference. No one would have missed hearing it. Instead of adopting this course, however, the Premier regaled his British audiences with the old sag of how Canada was made a nation, and of the virtues of colonial self-government. He peddled Wolfe, he peddled the claim, he grew eloquent over La Salle and the heroes of the French regime. The Premier was historical and reminiscent, when he should have been aggressive, prophetic, practical. He missed the opportunity of a generation.

It is probable that some arrangement will be made by which the Imperial Theatre will remain where it is, too it may be transformed into an annex of the church house, the building of which is expected to begin early in 1903. Since it was opened in 1876 the Aqueduct has been a famous place of amusement for Londoners.

VERY CAREFUL ABOUT STRIKES.

Executive Committee of Montreal Supreme in Critical Affairs.

The element among the non-favorable to the action of the Executive Committee in declaring strikes was defeated yesterday, when the effort made to change the constitution so that unions could strike was put up for consideration. The discussion was a lively one, and the majority favored leaving the proposition as of old. NO CESSATION OF STRIFE

There Can Be No Revival of Industry in Ireland Says Mr. Wyndham.

ATTACK BY IRISH LEADER, REDMOND.

Declares That the Irish Problem is More Dangerous Than It Has Been for 25 Years.

London, July 23.—The House of Commons to-night entered on a series of Irish debates. When the estimates for Ireland came up for discussion, John Redmond, chairman of the Irish Parliamentary party, moved the reduction of the salary of the Chief Secretary, George Wyndham. Mr. Redmond maintained that Mr. Wyndham had done nothing for the country and that the Irish problem was more dangerous to the empire to-day than it had been for a quarter of a century. Mr. Wyndham, in refuting this assertion, declared that he could at present offer no constructive policy, and maintained that there could be no cessation of agrarian strife, no revival of industry and no stanching of the flow of emigration and the union must become intolerable to the Unionists, and the idea of Home Rule impossible, even to those who have cherished it, unless and until the deplorable process of social proscription and the mismanagement of fear which have paralyzed every nerve of national life were repudiated by the good sense of the people and represented by the power of the government.
