COLD SNAP IN THE WEST.

Mercury Aways Below Zero and
Horses and Cattle Are Suffering.

Kamloops, B.C., March 13.—This vicinity
is experiencing one of the coldest winters
for this time of year in the history of the
country. At 7 o'clock this morning the
thermometer was 7 below zero. At 9 o'clock
it was 20 below, at Nicola Lake 28 below,
and at Lower Nicola 28 below.

Reports from the Nicola country state
that horses are dying fast and losses out-
side will be great if the weather does
not soon moderate. Cattle seem to be
holding their own at present, but feed
is getting very scarce, and unless the weather
soon abates it is estimated loss among
cattle will also be great.

Berlin, March 13.—The annual report of
the Hamburg-American Steamship Com-
pany, made public today, shows the net
profits to have been \$4,000,000, against \$4,
000,000 for 1901. The dividend of 4 1/2 per
cent, was declared, against 6 per cent. in
the previous year.

IS POISONED BY A FEATHER

Peculiar and Serious Accident to
David Walker, Formerly of
the Walker House.

ONE OF HIS EYES WAS TAKEN OUT

Lady With a Large Hat Turned
Around in the Elevator and
Caused the Injury.

As the result of a most peculiar ac-
cident, Mr. David Walker, formerly of
the Walker House, is critically ill at
San Antonio, Texas. About two weeks
ago Mr. Walker was a passenger in
the elevator at the Menger House, San
Antonio. A lady wearing a large hat
was also in the elevator, and the tip of
one of the feathers in the hat caught
Mr. Walker in the eye as the lady
turned round. The gentleman at once
felt an acute pain and had to get
medical attention. The eye became
very bad and eventually blood poison
set in, with the result that the left
eye had to be taken out, and for days
four were entertained as to Mr. Wal-
ker's recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker have for some
years wintered in San Antonio. When
the accident happened Dr. Wardell
was immediately summoned, but for
a couple of days the case was not
looked upon as serious. The latest ad-
vice is that Mr. Walker will recover.

His son-in-law, Mr. Alfred C. Nelson, of
Toronto, is with him.

PLAY AN EDUCATIONAL FACTOR.

James L. Hughes Lectures on the
Subject.

"Play as an Educational Factor" was
the subject of an interesting lecture
delivered by James L. Hughes to the
Household Economic Association last
night in Conservatory Hall. Mr.
Hughes is thoroughly familiar with all
kinds of educational systems, and of
every feature that goes to make up an
ideal program of learning. He has no
mean record as an athlete himself, and
has always advocated play and athletic
of all kinds in the public schools of
Toronto.

In dealing with the subject
last night, he first dealt with the child,
and his imaginative play, the boy "play-
ing horse," and the girl with her doll
and little dishes. "These things in the
children should be encouraged to a cer-
tain extent; they tended to develop
imagination, which was an essential
function in the life and character of
everyone. The parents should play
with their children more, lend them
toys to play with, and use them as a
means toward education. Then there
were the games of the children, the
older children, the good games, the
games that made muscle and strength-
ened the frame, as well as developing
and enlarging the mental faculties. Mr.
Hughes on this point recalled the mode
of some years ago, when the children
of the schools were flogged a great deal
to be a sin for girls to play, he said
tendency to help them bear more in
life, but he thought playing lacrosse,
football and other such sports had, of
necessity, the same effect. Good
hard games made men, noble and true.

In respect to girls and women, Mr.
Hughes was glad the old puritanical
ideas were fast passing away. It used
to be a sin for girls to play, he said
at least it was regarded as nearly sin-
ful and wicked for a girl to do any-
thing other than sit around and do
needlework.

Now girls played like boys, and it
was their duty that they did, too. In
England the ladies were playing football,
wearing such rational dress as allowed
them to run and kick the ball freely.
He hoped the people in Canada would
soon be free enough to allow this, too.

He then dealt with the games of the
adults, tennis and all such games.
He attributed the fact that women have
smaller brains than men to the fact
that for centuries women were not al-
lowed any exercising amusements.

In closing, Mr. Hughes hoped the par-
ents would take the matter seriously
and work in harmony with the school
teacher to develop play as an educa-
tional factor.

UNCLE SAM'S NAVY

May Be Called on to Defend U.S.
Subjects in Honduras.

Washington, March 13.—Acting Sec-
retary of the Navy Darling late this
afternoon sent a cablegram to Admi-
ral Coghlan to proceed to Honduras
with his squadron to protect Ameri-
can interests there. The order is the
outcome of a despatch received to-
day at the State Department from Wm.
C. Will, U.S. Vice-Consul at Ceiba, Hon-
duras, announcing that Ceiba had
been captured by the revolutionary
forces, and suggesting that a U.S.
warship be sent to Honduras waters.
The despatch was dated March 12. A
request also came for similar protection
from the U.S. Vice-Consul at Puerto
Cortes.

ACCUSED OF GRAVE ROBBERY.

Law Student Arrested on Serious
Charge Near Kingston.

Kingston, March 13.—A young man named
Hutton, who declares he is a law student,
has been arrested at Landow, accused
of attempted grave robbing. His accus-

Don't Want to Be Soldiers.


Belleville, March 13.—The police arrested

BURDICK'S WILL MADE PUBLIC.

His Wife Cut Off Altogether—Inquest
Begins on Tuesday.

Buffalo, March 13.—The Burdick inquest
will be commenced on Tuesday. Judge
McCarthy proposes to make it the most
searching investigation ever conducted into
death in the country. There are too many
persons lingering under suspicion of having
been concerned in Burdick's death, he
says, and he proposes to try and eliminate
the names of all innocent parties. Only
one person could be guilty of the deed,
and that person must be found.

Mrs. Sarah Paine has left Buffalo, and
to her husband at Batavia. Both have
been subpoenaed to appear at the inquest.
This afternoon the funeral of Arthur R.
Pennell and Mrs. Carrie Lamb Pennell
were held from the residence to the
Exchange-street station, the bodies al-
ready taken to Buffalo, N.Y., for interment.

In his will Burdick left off his wife,
whom he was suing for divorce, without a
cent. He leaves \$200 to relatives and the
rest of his property to his three children,
Charles and three daughters.

Dec. 8, 1902, Mr. Burdick names Charles
Parke and Ridley Tucker, his business as-
sociates, as guardians of his three chil-
dren. The will was admitted to probate.
The only objection on behalf of Mrs. Bur-
dick being in regard to the appointment
of executors for the children. This was
held in abeyance.

today held four of the alleged insur-
ance swindlers indicted by the Grand
Jury yesterday. Another doctor, Fel-

tempted grand larceny. The deputy
assistant district attorney asked that
he be fixed at \$20,000 in the case of
Trapani. He said he was able to show
that Trapani, in the past ten or fifteen
years, had swindled insurance com-
panies out of hundreds of thousands
of dollars.

Midland Carries Blylaw to Take Over

mitted a bylaw to take over the electric
light system to the property owners to-day,
and it was carried by a vote of 186 for and
17 against. The sum voted is \$20,000, of
which \$5000 is for the purchase of the
present company and the balance for
extensive improvements and addi-
tions to the present system. By this step
the town completes for the present its
ownership of municipal franchises, and

a very complete municipal outfit.
