Several years before 1796, Alexander Macomb, a rich fur trader of Detroit, acquired an enormous tract of land in the state where the ancestors of the Iroquois of St. Regis and of the Caughnawagas had their settlements. These Indians, though settled in Canada, never renounced their rights to the former home of their fathers, and entered into a treaty with the people of the State of New York, 1796, wherein, for a certain lump sum and a perpetual annuity of 213 pounds, 6 shillings and 8 pence, they gave a quit claim of all their lands situate within the state.

An eminent lawyer of Washington, D. C., has the Indians' case in hand and he is expected shortly in Caughnawaga, where he will meet the chiefs and people of St. Regis and the leading men of Caughnawaga.
