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RUSSIAN BIG GUNS TRAINED ON JEWS; 2,000 WERE MASSACRED IN POLISH CITY Prisoner Perishes Attempting to Burn a

Two Days' Slaughter of Innocent Follows Terrorist Attacks on Patrolmen and Soldiers-Infuriated Troops Make Shambles of Seidlce.

Siedlee, Poland Sept. 10 .- A Jewish massacre surpassing in seriousness all previous ones in this vicinity took place here Saturday and Sunday. It was carefully planned beforehand, the soldiers warning all of the Christian population in advance to hang out their ikons, so that they might remain undisturbed. Saturday night some Terrorists killed two soldiers, and thereupon the Libau Regiment broke forth in unrestrained fury. They began murdering Jews on every hand, and continued the work of slaughter all nigh Saturday, and all day Sunday.

The ghastly work of murdering and pillaging continued until early today, when Governor-General Skallon telegraphed for permission to use the artillery. Four batteries then opened fire down Pienkna, Warsaw and Aliena streets, which were inhabited by thousands of Jews. The destruction was hor rible. As a result of the general slaugh There are 3,000 prisoners in custody, a great many of whom are wounded. Not soldier was killed.

This morning squads of soldiers were parading through the streets, selling rillaged watches, and jewelry. The army officers openly countenanced the selling of loot. The governor took no steps to prevent the outrage.

Tiflis, Sept. 10. - Practically without warning, the side of a mountain nue car. rising above the township of Kwareli broke away, and in a sea of semiliquid mud, sand and stones, slid down on the township and overwhelmed and obliterated it. Some 255 persons have been buried alive. Fifty-five bodies already have been recovered from the mire, which is about six feet deep. TROLLEYS IN A CRASH ON BROOKLYN BRIDGE

New York, Sept. 10. - Twelve persons were injured, one of them fatally, n a collision between two trolley cars at the New York end of Brooklyn bridge today. The accident occurred while the early morning rush to the city was at its height, and was witnessed by hundreds of persons who were passing through the bridge terminal at the time. A Park avenue, Brooklyn, car had stopped at the loop entrance to wait for a switch to be adjusted. Another car which was follow ing came to a stop a few feet behind and a moment later a third car came bowling down the steep incline, crashed into the second, and forced it ahead with terrific force into the Park ave

Both ends of the second car were wrecked. In the crash Motorman Julius Scharff, of the third car, was probably fatally hurt. Both his legs were terribly crushed. None of the passengers injured was dangerously hurt though nearly all had painful cuts of bruises. Traffic was blocked for nearly
