**Weather Notes.**

A fairly important area of high pressure now covers the Great Lakes and Lawrence Valley, while in both the Maritime Provinces and the St. Lawrence Valley the pressure is relatively low, a particularly heavy thunderstorm occurred yesterday in the Toronto and Ottawa area, with scattered showers in other parts of Ontario, while in Quebec showers were common.

Paris, Aug. 21.—The French statement says:

"Last night enemy airplanes bombarded positions in our rear, particularly a collection camp for German prisoners, of whom a large number were killed."

In Belgium our aviators bombarded the railway stations at Thourout, Roulers and Aiden. In the region of Valenciennes they bombed the railway station at Valenciennes, the towns of Germin, Douchy and Riessels and Fleury, and munitions depots at Banchetteville, where they observed a great fire.
