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MEN WHO CAN RIDE WANTED FOR SIBERIAN FORCE

Men who are physically fit and can ride are wanted for the military mounted police of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force.

Instructions were received from Ottawa last night by Major John Hirsch, assistant provost-marshal of this district, to recruit at once men for this branch of the service.

Men must be fit so that on examination they can pass in the A-2 category and must be able to ride a horse. These are the only qualifications for this interesting branch of the work. Those wishing to join should write or see Major Hirsch at Wolsey Barracks, at once.

SIX FORWARDED BY RECRUITING MISSION

Six volunteers appeared before the medical board at the local mobilization centre Thursday. All men were natives of Canada with the exception of one, who was born in England. The men were of fine physical condition, and all were placed in category A2. E. C. Hall and A. W. Jordan, forwarded to this city by the British and Canadian recruiting mission at Detroit, were attached to the Canadian Engineers, as well as E. Y. Vester, who was attached to the same unit. H. E. Salisbury and J. Kenny were attached to the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force, and J. A. Betts, who was forwarded to Toronto to undergo further examinations prior to entering the Royal Air Force. No men coming under the military service act were brought up.

ANOTHER 142ND MAN DIES IN ACTION

Pte. Leonard Manston is another member of the 142nd (London) Trench Mortar Battalion who has sacrificed his life for freedom on the battlefields of France. The word of his death in action on September 8 was received by his aunt, Mrs. David Brooks, of 553 Hackett street, on Thursday. Pte. Manston has been wounded twice before, but each time he was able to go back to take up his work again. Prior to his enlistment he worked at one of the plants of the McCarty Manufacturing Company, and made his home with his aunt. His parents live in England.

NEW AGREEMENT TO INVEST DIOCESE OF HURON FUNDS MADE

Executive Committee Decides To Continue With T. and G. Co. of Toronto.

Several matters of outstanding importance were dealt with at the quarterly meeting of the executive committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron, such as the investment of the synod funds, inaugurating a synod budget system for all calls outside of purely parochial needs, and a request to erect a parish hall at a cost of \$25,000.

To invest Synod Funds.

Concerning the investment of synod funds, it was decided, after most thorough consideration, to enter upon a new agreement with the Trusts and Guarantee Company of Toronto, which had charge of the investment of the synod funds for the past ten years. Apart from the fact that relationship with the company have proved entirely satisfactory in the past, the Trusts and Guarantee Company offered the best terms of any company tendering still better, in fact, than for the former trustees, just being brought to a conclusion.

The question of investment of the funds is one which presents itself to the executive committee only once in five years, hence the importance of yesterday's meeting, and the desirability of a large attendance. Between 40 and 50 members of the executive were present on this occasion.

Budget To Be Prepared.

The budget, for the preparation of which steps will be immediately taken, will embrace all funds of the church in the diocese for the next year, such as social service, Sunday school commission, diocesan missions, etc.

A resolution of congratulation was passed to His Lordship the Bishop of Huron and the revision committee on the completion of their labors of revision, enrichment and enlargement of the Book of Common Prayer. The executive also took the first opportunity afforded of expressing its approval of the Prayer Book as it stands, and has been approved by the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada, recently in session.

Part of Funds for Hall.

St. Jude's Church, Brantford, of which Capt. (Rev.) C. E. Jenkins is rector, already has half the amount required to erect the parish hall, and the other half in sight. Under the circumstances permission was granted by the executive to the parish to proceed with the erection of the hall.

A petition from St. Luke's Church, Yarmouth, to become an independent parish, was considered and the petition granted.

Some assessments were revised and other minor business dealt with.

BOARD OF TRADE AS REORGANIZED HAS BIG PROGRAM AHEAD

J. C. R. Foster Sees Many Opportunities for Creation of Public Benefits.

Members of the executive committee of the London Board of Trade will meet this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the headquarters of the expansion and reorganization campaign at 353 Richmond street. The purpose of the gathering is to enable J. C. R. Foster, who is to direct the drive, to outline the plans and to take steps for the formation of some of the necessary committees.

Mr. Foster said he was greatly pleased with the outlook in London for the formation of a board of trade which shall become at once an essential part of the city's life.

In forecasting what the new board of trade will undertake to do first, Mr. Foster pointed out that under the form of organization which has been adopted this question will be strictly up to the membership as a whole.

He mentioned among the things done by boards elsewhere in operation with war activities, the stimulation of industry and social development, the creation of that sort of confidence which begets better business, attention to agriculture, education and the beauty spots of the city and the maintenance of bureaus to give special attention and advice to manufacturers, merchants, real estate and insurance interests, etc.

Mr. Foster recalled that Athens, Florence and Venice at the height of their glory had populations only a little larger than that of London today.

"Your city is one of a score in Canada," he said, "with sufficient wealth to do the work of ancient Athens or Florence or Venice. The first Canadian city—why—organizes its citizenship to the end of bringing out all the genius, all the enterprise, all the vision the people possess, may hope to rank in history with the greatest of all cities."

MUSIC RECITAL GETS HEARTY APPLAUSE OF PLEASED AUDIENCE

Miss Newbury of London Conservatory Gives Program of Rare Quality.

A complimentary recital given in Conservatory Hall last evening by talented members of the staff of the London Conservatory of Music attracted a large and most appreciative audience.

Miss Georgina M. Newbury, reader, presented the program on this occasion assisted by John Melvin Bush, violinist, and Mrs. McHardy-Smith, accompanist. Miss Newbury's versatility and skill in the interpretation of character parts were revealed in numbers ranging from "The Passing of the Third Floor Back" to "The Frenchman's Boy" and "The Frenchman's Boy." and delicious sketches of child life, with its humorous tragedies, by James Whitcomb Riley, and Edmund Vance Cooke. The artist presented also an arrangement of her own of the beautiful schoolboy reciting "The Boy Stood on the Burning Deck."

While all her selections were interesting and entertaining, the greatest scope for her dramatic power was afforded in "The Passing of the Third Floor Back" in which she was particularly successful in her interpretation and differentiation of the various characters. A British "Levee" struck the right note for the conclusion of the evening. Mr. Bush's contribution added interest to the evening, and excellent style. His offerings included a Bach group, the ever popular "Air on G String," played with dignity and breadth of style, and two rhythmic dances, marked by nicety of phrasing and crispness.

Seeing "Hey-Da-Day" (Kreisler) on the program, musical people present expected to be introduced to a stranger. It was a new one on them. Puzzled expressions gave place to smiles as the bow was drawn, and with the first joyous bar an old favorite was recognized, even after being rechristened in obedience to the dictates of patriotism. Played with a delightful swing and happy abandon by the violinist, it was a most enjoyable feature of the evening. Mrs. McHardy-Smith, as always, was a rarely sympathetic accompanist. A MINOR.

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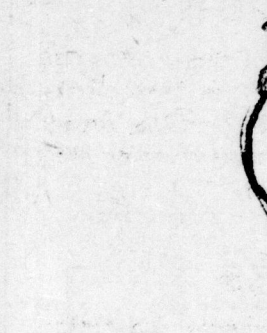

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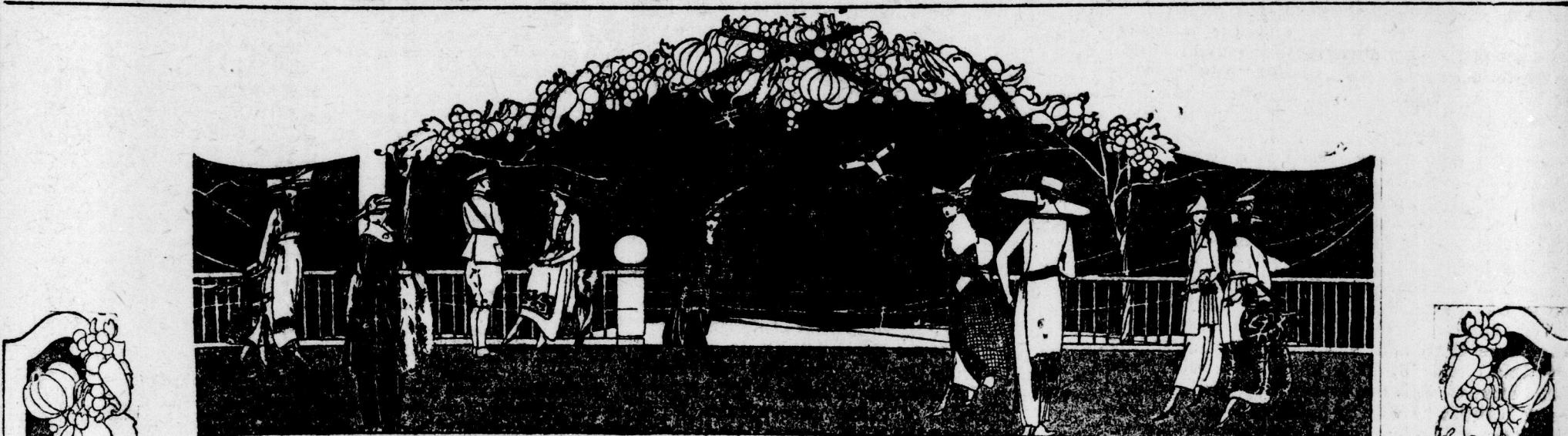
