

AIM TO SEND REVOLUTION TO ENTENTE

Spartacans Want Allies To In-
vade Germany for This
Purpose.

PLAN WORLD REVOLUTION

Willing To Sacrifice German
Republic To Give So-
cialism Fling.

BERNE, Jan. 9.—The first clear, and at the same time most sensational, statement on the issues involved in the struggle between the Spartacus group and the majority Socialists in Germany appears in the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung. The issue, the paper says, arose from the fear on the part of many Germans that the bourgeois government of the Entente countries will attempt to crush the proletarian German republic.

The majority Socialists would save the revolution by establishing as quickly as possible an orderly government which the Entente could recognize, and with which it could make peace. The Spartacus group is quite willing to sacrifice the German republic and have it strangled by the Allies if in the process the soldiers of the Allies themselves become infected with the germs of revolution.

Aimed at the Entente.
The Spartacus group is anxious above all to carry the revolution over into the Entente countries. They want first to establish in Germany a proletarian dictatorship and to proceed thence with energy to socialize all industries. This is to be followed by an alliance with the Russian Bolsheviks directed against the Entente. This, the Spartacus group hope, will stir the British, French and Italian workers to similar actions.

The Spartacus group is fully aware that such action would provoke Entente invasion of Germany, but it is on this that they build their greatest hopes. They figure that if the Entente troops are forced once more to enter the war instead of being demobilized, they will become rebellious, and when they enter Germany they will become infected with a revolutionary spirit.

Want World Revolution.
The result would be that the German revolution would be carried westward and the world revolution kindled, and that alone makes possible the establishment of Socialism.

The following opinion of Bolshevism was expressed today to the Tribune by Herman Greulich, founder of the Swiss Social-Democratic movement and a friend of Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels, founders of modern Socialism.

"Europe and the world generally have nothing to fear from Bolshevism, but everything to fear from hunger. German Bolshevism is not to be taken seriously, but hunger is to be taken most seriously."

Greulich, who is 76 years old, said that Bolshevism was not the cause, but only the effect of the war.

Doomed to Bankruptcy.
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Referring to Karl Liebknecht, Greulich said he had known the German Bolshevik leader from childhood. "Liebknecht," he said, "is simply a nervous man. I have a high regard for him personally; he is a brilliant scholar, but has the sort of mind that will not see obstacles."

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WINDSOR PHYSICIAN ISSUED 222 ORDERS FOR LIQUOR IN DAY

Government Vendor Said He
Filed 1,244 in December.

FOUND OFFICE PACKED

License Inspector Discovered
That Doctor's Office Was
Popular Place.

WINDSOR, Jan. 9.—Charged with having issued prescriptions for liquor in larger quantity than was consistent, Dr. J. N. Gardiner, 144½ Gladstone avenue, was found guilty and fined \$200, with costs of \$45.50 additional, in police court here today. Several witnesses gave evidence against the accused physician.

Donald Fraser, who conducts the Government liquor store, testified that 222 prescriptions for whiskey had been received from Dr. Gardiner in a single day in the month of December. The physician's total liquor prescriptions for December were 1,244, Fraser said.

License Inspector Mousseau said he called at Dr. Gardiner's office and found the office crowded with people. Others were waiting on the sidewalk for a chance to get inside and see the doctor.

Dr. Gardiner took the stand in his own behalf, and stated he had been in Windsor two years ago, attracted by chances for speculation in real estate. Among his friends only. He was sure he had prescribed other medicines besides whiskey, but was told by Crown Attorney Road that none of the local drug stores had any record of any orders from him for anything except liquor.

In imposing sentence, Magistrate Fraser delivered a scathing arraignment of the physician, declaring: "A reputable physician would issue as many as 222 orders for liquor in one day."

Counsel for Dr. Gardiner announced that an appeal would be taken. It cost Richard Cere, a boarder at Stephens' Inn, \$206.50, in police court here today, when an officer saw him carrying a bottle of whiskey out of a local hotel. Cere's excuse was that he had "found" the liquor, but the court did not concur.

**\$3,170,221 in
Canadian Coins
Minted in 1918**

4,435,200 Shilling Blanks
Also Produced and Sent
to England.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—Canadian coins to the value of \$3,170,221 were issued by the Ottawa branch of the royal mint, during the year just closed. Coins to the value of \$245.00 for Newfoundland comprising 620,000 silver pieces, were also issued. The total number of Canadian pieces coined during 1918 was 30,251,468, and the total number coined of all kinds was 32,757,429. During the year 4,435,200 shilling blanks were produced and shipped to the royal mint in London.

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ALLIES DELIVER ULTIMATUM TO STUBBORN TURK

Will Destroy Forts of Dar-
danelles Unless Medina
Troops Surrender.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—The Allies have notified Turkey that unless the Turkish forces at Medina lay down their arms immediately, the forts at the Dardanelles will be destroyed.

The Turks have shown an unwillingness to surrender in accordance with the armistice terms, but all the earlons, except that at Medina, which is the largest in Arabia, laid down their arms through peaceful persuasion. Fakhri Pasha, the commander at Medina, offered one excuse after another until the Allies were forced to send an ultimatum to the Turkish Government.

FOUND NOT GUILTY ON GROUND OF INSANITY
