

GRAN MARKETS ARE HIGHER WHEAT CABLES ARE STRONGER

Strong Foreign Cables With Renewed Interest in Cash Enquiry Were Assigned Features For Advance.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, March 23. Liverpool wheat futures to-day closed 1/2 higher, and oats 1/4 higher than yesterday. Chicago May wheat closed 1/2 higher, corn 1/4 higher, and oats 1/4 higher. Winnipeg car lots of wheat to-day closed against 65 this day last year. France—Drought has been relieved by good rains, but outlook still uncertain. Supplies sufficient for present requirements. Germany—Weather mild, which will permit winter crop. Outlook for winter crop is poor, supplies native wheat very small. Hungary—An official report covering up to March 15 states that the outlook for the crop is mostly satisfactory. Subsequent frost has been harmful, and spring wheat is backward. Roumania—Weather continues favorable, being mild, which is beneficial to the crops. Outlook is on the whole favorable. Russia—Weather continues mild and with heavy snowfall, which is plenty of moisture. Outlook has improved and now more hopeful. Supplies fair. Sweden—Weather very dry, supplies native wheat are very scarce. Italy, Spain, North Africa—Outlook continues very favorable.

GRAIN RATES ARE REDUCED. NEW YORK, March 23.—Rates from Buffalo to New York on grain for export have been cut from 50c to 40c per bushel. This reduction follows a protest raised by the New York Produce Exchange, which claimed that this port was being discriminated against in favor of Montreal and other Canadian ports.
