



TORONTO AND NIAGARA RAILWAY TO BE BUILT CITY CENTRE OF SYSTEM

William Mackenzie Announces Immediate Construction of the New Road, and Talks of Local Links in the C. N. Lines.

"A month or six weeks." That is the time set by Mackenzie and Mann, in which to start construction of a new Canadian Northern line between Niagara River and Ottawa by way of Tonto. While spreading their rails at a marvelous rate over the wheat fields the new provinces, the Canadian railway builders are not devoting ail their energies to the west. Old Ontario is now to be the scene of Canadian Northern expansion, and the most interesting phase, so far as this city is concerned, of these proposals is that Toronto is to be the centre of the railway development.

Fresh from the London money market, William Mackenzle of the Canadian Northern Railway sat in his office yesterday and told a World reporter something of his plans for the immediate future. The \$4,000,000 secured in England for railway development in old Ontario would give the Niagara-Ottawa proposed road a good start, he said, in fact it would jus about build the branch between Niagara and Toronto. That was as near as Mr. Mackenzie would go towards suggesting that the Toronto-Niagara branch would be constructed first.

"We have our right of way from Niagara, which brings up right into To-ronto," he continued. "That will feed our Northern line and will also give us an opportunity to connect with the American roads at the international line. We need not follow the Electric Development pole line all the way, but the chances are that we will use the most of it."

The proposed line between Toronto and Ottawa will follow the route mapped out when the charter was applied two years ago, with one or two local deviations. Between the Don and East Toronto the line will run a con-siderable distance north of the original route and further out it will keep closer to he lake, about dividing the distance between Brooklin and Whitby and connecting with the original oute a few miles east of these points. 


