

PEEL UNIT GOES TO THE RAVIDA

Moves Today From Exhibition Camp to New Quarters in West End.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE

Every Accommodation Possible Provided to Make Men Comfortable.

Lt.-Col. W. Wallace's 234th Peel Battalion will move today from Exhibition Camp to splendid new quarters in the Ravina barracks at West Toronto.

Extensive improvements being made at the barracks, involving an outlay of \$7,500 by the battalion and \$3,000 by the government, are turning the building into one of the finest places for the housing of troops in the whole Dominion.

In equipping the Ravina barracks the battalion staff has kept uppermost the matter of the men's comfort and also facilities to give them recreation.

The 234th Battalion, now 425 strong, expects to gain 70 or 80 per cent. of its new recruits from West Toronto. Features of the Ravina Barracks that will appeal to the soldiers are the big dining room, capable of seating 1000 at a time; the men's recreation room with telephone, graphophone, piano, games, gymnasium apparatus and reading and writing facilities; hospital accommodation in the same building; the big hockey rink, a canteen, ten shower baths with hot and cold water, all in heated rooms; and the attractive sergeants' mess room.

The 36th Peal Regiment to which the 234th Battalion is attached, has produced more color for the C. E. Forces than any other regiment in Canada. They are: Lieut.-Col. R. C. A few days ago the Germans sent out despatches thru the medium of American correspondents with their armies on the Transylvanian front, saying that the Roumanians used pointed stakes instead of barbed wire before their trenches and that their troops were delighted with the prospect of getting away from trench warfare.

The Russians lost some more advanced trenches before a German attack on the eastern bank of the Stokhod River south of Witonetz. Petrograd says that the approach of winter has already precluded the possibility of further operations on a large scale on the Russian western front.

Ceremony Will Take Place at Varsity Stadium Next Thursday.

BIG PARADE FOR TODAY

All Troops in Camp Will March Thru Downtown Streets.

Announcement is made that the 20th Beaver Battalion, Lieut.-Col. W. H. Price, M.L.A., commander, will be presented with colors next Thursday afternoon at Varsity Stadium.

The 4000 troops composing the 1st Brigade at Exhibition Camp, consisting of the 193th Buffs, 204th Beaver, 208th Irish-Canadian, 220th York and 234th Peel Battalions, will march to Cedarvale today and on their return to camp are expected to pass thru the city via Avenue Road, Queen's Park, University avenue and West Adelaide street.

Out of 28 men applying for enlistment yesterday at the Toronto armories 15 were accepted for active service. The Army Service Corps secured nine accepted recruits, the Cavalry Ordnance Corps two, and the 204th Beavers, 208th Irish-Canadian, 234th Peel Battalion and Canadian Engineers one each.
