## **GOMPERS ASSAILS PRO-SOVIET CRITICS**

Brands as Unpatriotic Unions Blaze Causes Loss of Fifty Which Have Demanded Endorsement of Lenine.

Washington, March 28.-Samue Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, yesterday de-nounced as "unpatriotic Americans" those labor leaders who severely criti-cized his refusal to endorse the Russian Soviet government or to urge its recognition by the United States.


