GREEK ARMY BEARS PRUSSIAN STAMP

King Ardent Admirer of German System

HIS OWN MILITARY CAREER

Has Not Hesitated to Share The Dangers—Is Field Marshall of the German Army

Should Greece enter the European war arena some interesting military figures will be added to those already in the martial limelight, for Greece has seen quite a few wars since the middle nineties—indeed she has seen little else, and there has grown up among certain circles of the Greek people a strong military tradition.

To the average Greek the great military figure of his country is Constantine I, the king of the Greeks. But his greatness rests rather on the personal courage with which he has taken the active command of his country's troops in the last two successful wars. That he is a military genius in any sense of the word is the real military men of the country pretend. The real military genius of Greece in the as yet merely Balkan sphere of his activities is General Victor Dousmanis general of brigade, chief of the general staff of Greece. In Greece only the king is a field marshal, and Constantine I. is field marshal not only of Greece, but of Prussia as well.

For his age General Dousmanis has made by rapid strides to arrive at the supreme effective command of the army of 65,000 men in time of peace, and roughly 80,000 men in time of war. He was born on August 20, Greek calendar—Sept. 2, our calendar—1861, on the island of Corfu. He has been a professional soldier all his life, graduating from the military school and entering the regular army at once as a second lieutenant in 1882, where he had a rapid rise in the engineering branch of the service.

Army Prussiaized

When the disastrous war with Turkey was undertaken in 1897, Dousmanis had already been a captain seven years. He was attached to the general staff of the then crown prince, now the king. Throughout that war and the long years that followed, in which Prince Constantine planned and effected the regeneration of the Greek army Dousmanis was his right hand man. They shared and still share, the same admiration for or belief in the Prussian system, and de-

spite the training of the Greek army as a whole by a French military mission. King Constantine and his chief of staff have succeeded in putting upon the officers of the army a thoroughly Prussian stamp.

During the successful war against the Ottoman Empire in 1912 the then Lieutenant Dousmanis was again attached to the staff of Crown Prince Constantine, and when the latter became king he was made chief of the general staff, a post which he held through the war against Bulgaria, and has held since. In addition he was also his sovereign's aide-de-camp in the war and he tells which the king himself confirms, that the two were with the young Crown Prince George watching the battle of Kilkich from behind a cemetery wall when a rifle bullet struck the gold wrist watch on Prince George's arm clipping the watch off neatly and smashing it beyond repair, though not even leaving a scratch

on the prince's wrist. Both the king and his chief of staff believe in being where they can see what is going on in a battle.

Has Prussian Decorations

Speaking of the honors which have from time to time been bestowed upon him, it is characteristic of General Dousmanis that he could remember only two that he is Commander of the Order of the Savior—a Greek order

and wears the grand cordon of the Crown of Prussia.

An entirely different type is General Constantine Moskopoulis, general of division and commander of the third Greek army with headquarters at Saloniki. He is an older man than General Dousmanis, having been born in Constantinople during the Crimean war in 1854. He, too, is a professional soldier, graduating from the military academy in 1877 and entering the artillery corps when he made a name for himself in the Mountain Artillery Corps.

General Moskopoulis is a specialist in taking mountains. If Greece should ever enter the war he will be most useful to the European commanders in showing them how to get over trackless peaks. He has no appearance of a rugged mountaineer, however—dandified, agreeable, talkative, little man with upturned waxed blonde moustache, gold wrist watch and half a dozen rings on his fingers.

Skilled in Hill Fighting

Nevertheless at the battle of Sarandapoulo in the war against Turkey in 1912, already a general of division, he received the order from the Crown Prince Constantine to cross Mount Kavnounian and attack the Turks from the rear at Sarandapoulo. His men had to march single file and made a line fourteen miles long. He reached Rakhorvo in the evening and attacked the enemy the following morning at seven o'clock. The struggle was one between mountain guns and field pieces, and General Moskopoulis' mountain artillery won the day, twenty-four of the Turkish pieces falling into the hands of the Greeks. In similar fashion the general crossed Mt. Vermion for the battle of Constantinople and Mt. Litzika to attack the fortress of Vessanpoulo.

The story is told that at Florina General Moskopoulis appeared suddenly before the city and sent word to the Turkish commander couched in the following terms: "Surrender or I shall attack at once with all my divisions." The Turkish commander was amazed. He had no idea that there were so many Greeks in the vicinity. "With all his divisions," exclaimed the poor Turk "Allah's will be done," and he surrendered thirty cannon, a regiment of cavalry and several thousand miscellaneous infantry.

General Moskopoulis had just one division.

Best Known Warrior

Probably the best known of Greece's warriors is General O. Douglis, general of brigade, commanding the fifth Greek army, with headquarters at Ioannina. He recently he was minister of war in Venizelos' ill-starred cabinet. He is a very able man. Comparatively young, he too, had made a reputation in the three wars Greece has waged since 1897. A facile, courteous, more widely traveled than most Greek soldiers, having been one of his country's representatives in the London-Balkan conference as well as

a military observer at French manoeuvres, he inclined to disagree with his colleagues General Dousmanis and Moskopoulis, as to the invincibility of the central empires. For the present, there-

fore his influence in the Greek military establishment is in eclipse. But should Greece joined the quadruple entente there is little doubt that he would at once become a leading martial figure of Greece.

Help to Make Her Dream Come True

SHE is one of some Three Million Belgians who, since they refused to sell their honor to Germany, have lived on the brink of starvation. A thriving industrial people, used to life's comforts, they have been reduced to a state where they dream, not of luxuries or pleasures, but of having enough to eat!

True to their character as the war has unmasked it, the Germans callously refuse to help the starving. The task of feeding them has been undertaken by Belgium's Allies and Neutral Nations, through the

Belgian Relief Fund

provided by voluntary contributions and administered with wonderful economy and efficiency by a neutral Commission.

Absolutely none of the supplies go to Germany, and most of the food taken into the country is paid for by Belgians who have still a little money. But to feed those who cannot pay, nearly \$2,500,000 a month is needed!

Surely no people ever deserved our sympathy and aid more than do these starving Belgians!

They face a winter of necessity, while we are living in plenty. The Fund needs regular weekly or monthly contributions rather than larger but spasmodic gifts. Let us plan to deny ourselves, if necessary—share with our needy Allies—and help to save their lives.
