GOVERNOR'S LADY WELCOMED BY OTTAWA WOMEN

Viscountess Willingdon Hopes to Help in Upbuilding of Canada

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—"I pray to God that He will grant me the power to be able some day to win your friendship, may I say, love, and that He may give me the strength to be of some real use to this great country of yours—your Canada," was the pith of the message from Her Excellency the Viscountess Willingdon, when on Saturday she was welcomed by the Ottawa Women's Canadian Club. Her Excellency, it was announced, had become the honorary patroness of this club. She wore a simply designed dress of black crepe, the only touch of color being at the cuffs which were of pale rose embroidery. Two strands of pearls, one of which was attached to a pendant of a heart shaped pearl, with diamond settings, were worn, as well as pearl earrings, and a diamond bracelet. Her Excellency's hat was a tailored style of black felt, the crown of which was draped with black velvet and adorned with a brilliant ornament.

Her Excellency opened her address by thanking all for the kind welcome extended to her. She then referred to the charter objective of the Women's Canadian Club, among others that of the uniting of Canadian women in the performance of patriotic and charitable work.

"I can conceive no higher purpose for any national institution," she said. "Women in these days play a very important part in every sphere of national life, and they must have an intimate knowledge of the history and conditions of their own country and of other countries also; for conditions in one part of the world react on those of another. Your meetings here are designed to enable you to obtain this knowledge in the easiest and best manner."

LADY SMITH IS DEAD AT DORCHESTER, N. B.

Was Widow of Sir Albert J. Smith and Native of Halifax

DORCHESTER, Oct. 24.—With deep sorrow the community learnt of the death of Lady Sarah M. Smith, widow of Sir Albert J. Smith, K.C., M.G., Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Mackenzie administration, who passed away at her home, Woodlawn, here at 1 o'clock today, aged 79 years. She was the daughter of John Wilson Young, and was born and educated in Halifax. She was married in 1868 and came to Dorchester where she has resided ever since.

She is survived by one son, John W. Y. Smith, president of Reed & Co., Ltd., of Moncton, one granddaughter, Mrs. Donald Cowl, and great-granddaughter, Miss deLancy Cowl, of New York. Mr. Smith and Mrs. Cowl were with her when she passed away.

The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Holy Trinity church.

The late Sir Albert Smith was one of the most notable of the residents of Dorchester, and one of the greatest benefactors that the town has known. His wife shared with him the love and devotion of the people and won for herself a place of special esteem by her kindness and her gracious manner. Although she lived quietly and did not take a prominent part in public affairs she was a woman of exceptional intellectual attainments. Her death is a very real loss to the town and district where she has resided.

P.E.I. SHIPS 98,000-BUS. CARGO OF POTATOES

CHARLOTTETOWN, Oct. 24.—The S.S. Tola, Captain A. Hough, sailed from here for Jersey City with 98,000 bushels of potatoes, the largest cargo of seed potatoes ever shipped from this province.

PROVISIONS OF WEYMOUTH SHIP COMMANDEERED

Food Taken to Feed Destitute on Turk's Island—Storm Described

YARMOUTH, Oct. 24.—The Weymouth tern schooner, Leo LeBlanc, 380 tons, arrived here last evening after a passage of 21 days from Turk's Island with a full cargo of salt for Parker Eakins Co., Limited. The schooner's officers reported a good run as far as Bermuda, but when in the vicinity of those islands the craft ran into a series of gales which followed the LeBlanc right to Yarmouth, and 16 days were consumed in that portion of the passage.

Capt. Bonenfant sailed from Yarmouth on August 12 for Barbados with a cargo of slaves and made a good run there. Twenty-six days after leaving his home port he sailed from Barbados for Turk's Island with every prospect of making a fast round voyage. Following that, however, he met with much adverse weather and was delayed for several days. He was swept by a hurricane which swept Turk's Island early in September, by putting into Gustavus.

FOOD COMMANDEERED

Twelve days passed by before he reached his loading port, and there he found much destitution caused by the ravages of the hurricane. The people of the island were practically without food, and were only subsisting on fish. The port officials boarded the Leo LeBlanc and commandeered about all the provisions, such as flour, etc., which were on board. Four days later a relief ship arrived and then the schooner was reimbursed for what had been taken.

INDUSTRY DISRUPTED

Capt. Bonenfant states he was two weeks getting his cargo, and he reports that the salt industry of the island is in a badly crippled condition, as all the windmills, together with grinding apparatus, are levelled to the ground and must be rebuilt before operations can be resumed another season.

Windsor Man Kills Wildcat With Hands

WINDSOR, N. S., Oct. 24.—When he sought traces of the animal that had been raiding his flock of lambs yesterday, Lionel P. Bennett, farmer and landholder of Brooklyn, near here, became so enraged at the sight of a wild cat making a meal of a freshly killed lamb, that he climbed up a tree after the beast and killed it with his bare hands.

Bennett suffered severely from scratches on his arms and face. He said he was afraid the cat would get away if he went home for his gun.

Rare Books In List For Sale At Sotheby's

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Kilmarnock edition of Burns, once owned by the poet's intimate friend, Lord Glencairn, and the equally rare Mainze edition of Cicero are among items soon to be sold at Sotheby's when the famous book auctioneers will offer three old libraries for sale.

As much as \$6,000 has been paid for the little, blue backed Kilmarnock Burns. The Mainze Cicero, printed in 1485, was the first classic printed on paper and in Greek type. Copies in the past have commanded large prices.

LORD WILLINGTON NOTICE IN GAZETTE

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—Formal notice of his appointment is posted by the new Governor-General of Canada, Viscount Willingdon, in this week's Canada Gazette. It states that the King "by commission under His Royal Manual sign and signet" has authorized, empowered and commanded His Excellency to exercise the duties of Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion, and adds:

"Now, therefore, know ye that I have thought fit to issue this proclamation in order to make known His Majesty's said appointment, and I do also hereby require and command that all and singular His Majesty's officers and ministers in the said Dominion of Canada do continue in the execution of their several and respective offices, places and employments and that His Majesty's loving subjects and all other whom it may concern do take notice hereof and govern themselves accordingly."
