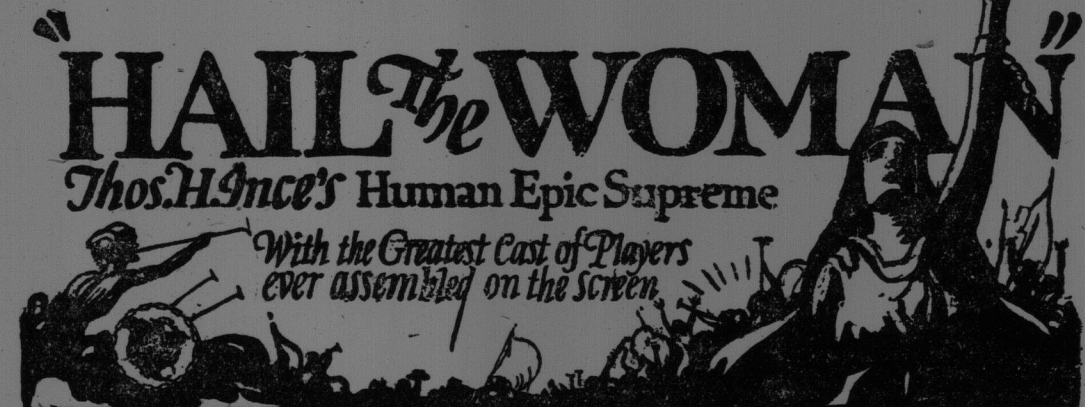
"Easy but long" is the description some of the players gave the local Belvedere course. It measures about a mile and a half, with the first hole 450 yards.
