## SHOWS NERVE WITH LEG IN DEADLY GRIP

Whelan Smokes During His Rescue at Fore River.

Quincy, Dec. 15.—There may be nervous men in the employ of the Fore River Shipbuilding Company than Harold Whelan, aged twenty-six, of Dorchester, who has been shown up yet. While young Whelan was waiting for fellow workmen to lift tons of steel plates from one of his legs, which had been practically cut off at the knee by the pile of metal which had toppled over on him, the young man calmly smoked cigarettes for nearly half an hour. During that time Dr. W. B. Hurley stayed by his side, holding a tourniquet above the knee, and alongside the pile of steel a motor ambulance stood waiting to take Whelan to the hospital the moment he was released. High overhead an electric crane picked the plates one by one from the prostrate man. It was delicate work to fasten the hooks and chains around the plates without imposing any additional jar on Whelan's legs. More than one workman turned away from the sight with a sinking stomach, but Whelan calmly smoked until the last plate was lifted. Then willing hands quickly lifted him on a stretcher and he was placed in the ambulance, losing no time in making the Quincy City Hospital.
