CONSTANTINE
THINKS GREEKS
MOURN FOR HIM
 Again Denies He Was Pro-German—Only Wanted to Keep His Country Out of the War

Lucerne, July 30.—(Correspondence)—It has been the bright thought of some social genius to arrange an interview with ex-King Constantine of Greece to come right between the salad and the desert of a banquet to be given to American Peace Conference correspondents by the Swiss of Lucerne. The dinner and the ex-king were in the same hotel. Thus it was that in the middle of another tribute given by one republic to another republic should all go off and see a king. Soon we stood in the ex-king's presence and tried to distinguish wherein royalty lay. Certainly Constantine's dinner jacket was more frayed than any of us would like to have worn—and he had a strangely shaped head. It was a head that bulged in front and behind and was small in the middle and like a well developed potato. It brought to one's mind all the hair-raising stories of the deformed at birth. The uneasy, restless pouch-surrounded blue eyes under the bulging and wrinkled dead-white forehead recalled the blinking big-headed infants one finds in certain hospital wards. The interview was slow in getting started. The ex-king was reluctant to answer questions—asking them if they were to be in Lucerne, and watching closely to see if their tone was friendly. One led to the search for his face and manner for effects of the strange life he is living. He is surrounded by an entourage of fifty people all in either hidden activity or forced idleness. Every time he stirs out of the hotel a Swiss detective follows him and another detective follows the detective to see that he is not corrupted. Gradually the interview took its gait and began to mean something as the questioned and questioners began to feel their way into each others' personalities. Constantine still stood with his feet well apart and shifted his weight from one foot to the other constantly—his hands twitched nervously behind his back. He was asked what he thought of the peace treaty; if there was any indication of Bolshevism in Greece; if he believed the Czar was dead; what he

thought of the League of Nations, and then what he thought of—Venizelos. This was getting close home for it was Venizelos, now premier, who forced Constantine from the throne, and Greece into the war on the side of the Allies. "I don't think he is as popular as he was," said the ex-king quickly, with a queer thick utterance possibly due to his Danish ancestry and education. "You see, I didn't bring back from the Peace Conference all that he promised to bring." (Who did?) "Do you think Greece will ever go over to the side of Germany?" Here Constantine saw his chance to deny, gain his German leanings. "Oh, no. And I want to say here that there never was any danger of that. I never was pro-German. They led about me." He spoke without modulation of his voice. His remarks throughout were punctuated with commas, semicolons and periods, only were without emphasis. His words were as colorless as the dots and dashes of a telegram. "I wanted to keep Greece out of the war because I think a small country always gets the worst of it in a war between bigger nations. Events have proven that I was right. Greece now has a national debt that will be a burden for generations." "Do you think Venizelos will be overthrown?" "Well, that depends on the elections being honest. I fear that they will not be." "Who do you think the people want?" "I think it will be a choice between Venizelos and me. Not that I care a hang for myself, but I want my people to have whom they wish."

GREAT FUTURE IN
STORE FOR CANADA

U.S. of Today Only a Prototype of Canada at Close of Century
 (By A. B. Cooper, Canadian Associated Press).
 London, Aug. 15.—I met Sir Arthur Bann, and knowing that he is deeply interested in Imperial questions, and in Canada especially, I took the opportunity of asking him to talk to me on the subject. "Now that Canada has made a great leap forward," said Sir Arthur, "achieving in a decade what she might have achieved in half a century, what are we going to do to stabilize that new found position, to make it a platform from which this vast dominion, with its mighty promise of greatness in achievement, may go on to even higher prospects. This is destined to be Canada's century. I could easily prophesy, and if I did so venture I would say that the United States of today is only a prototype of what Canada will be at the close of the twentieth century, and what I prophesy of Canada I prophesy also of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa." "Personally, I am inclined to think that the basis of trade relations, superimposed, of course, upon the sense of natural kinship of which I have already spoken is the most promising road to these great ends. I see that the Canadian government has sent to London a trade mission which has already done very notable work in directing Canada's policy of trade. Surely this is a good precedent. What Canada has done why should not the other dominions do? Why, indeed, should not the Mother Country trade union which should watch every trade route as the British Navy watches every coast, whose duty it should be to assist and further any enterprise which is for the well-being and prosperity of the Empire."

WHY MAUBEUGE SURRENDERED
 Paris, Aug. 16.—That the forts around Maubeuge were obsolete and incapable of withstanding artillery fire was brought out by a court of investigation into the surrender of Maubeuge to the Germans in September 1914, according to information received officially. The investigation is charged in army circles, is an attempt on the part of politicians to place responsibility for the fall of Maubeuge on the general staff, while the latter, defending itself, is shifting the blame to the war minister, who had office in September, 1914, and to his predecessor.
