WHITE TAFFETA FROCK



It is still the most elegant mode of the season to have a white taffeta frock. The model shown here is carried out in pussy willow taffeta, trimmed with its own material. Of course with the ruffles on the neck and the sash one has ample chance to ring in many novel color schemes. The ruffles may be hemmed with black or some other dark color, preference, however, being given to black.

Directions are given for the construction of the waist because it serves acceptably as a separate model. Five yards of 40-inch taffeta will be required to make the dress, and a good quality coat about 2 1/2 per yard. One yard of 36-inch lining will be sufficient for the waist. Two or three yards of ribbon will be needed for the belt, according to the size of the bow and length of the streamers.

First make the lining, by closing shoulder and underarm seams. Hem neck and fit. For the outside close under-arm and sleeve seams as indicated. Turn hem in back at notches. Gather lower edge between double

TRAM LINE OR MOTOR BUSES TO ROCKWOOD

Mayor Suggests That City Provide Transportation - \$1,000 For Salem - Police Inquiry Next Month - Concrete Sidewalks - Chief Blake's Appointment Made Permanent

At yesterday's meeting of the common council the sum of \$1,000 was ordered to be forwarded by the city to the relief of the sufferers in the Salem, Mass.

Mayor Frink remarked upon the great numbers of people who had visited Rockwood Park on the last few Sundays, and said that steps should be taken by the city to provide motor bus or tram connection from the city. Since the city is now paying \$4,000 a year for the upkeep of the park, it should be made more accessible than it is.

The inquiry to be held by W. B. Chandler, of Moncton, as special commissioner to investigate the charges against Police Chief Clark, will not begin until after July 12. Mayor Frink promised yesterday to submit his findings upon the evidence given at the recent police inquiry, at a special council meeting to be held this week.

Street and sidewalk paving problems cupped much of the time at the meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon. Com. Potts again made an appeal for the privilege of laying permanent sidewalks to be paid for by a bond issue, and when this was refused, submitted a letter voicing his formal protest.

After a long wait, during which time the petition has been mislaid, the council agreed to lay a permanent paving in one block of Orange street.

A communication from residents of Lower street, West End, asking for an estimate of the cost of a concrete sidewalk for seventy-five feet on Lower street was referred to the commissioner of public works.

Com. Potts presented a communication from the dominion department of public works asking the city to contribute half the cost of a concrete sidewalk at \$1.60 a yard in Sherfield street in front of the new armory. He moved that the agreement be entered into.

According to the latest calculations for the approval of the road engineer, the motion was amended to provide for the specifications and was carried. E. W. Emerson, West St. John, asked for an estimate of the cost of a concrete

BIG APPLE CROP FOR NOVA SCOTIA PREDICTED

Two million barrels of apples were expected by the energetic orchardists of the Annapolis Valley and for a while there was every indication that this expectation would be realized.

The frost of June 9 did some very drastic damage to the apple crop, but the original estimates have had to be revised.

According to the latest calculations of the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia there will even now be a million and a half barrels of shipping apples, about 900,000 of which will be handled by this company.

The most pleasing feature of this year's crop is the entire absence of blight or scab, due in a great measure to the thoroughness of spraying operations that have been carried out in a manner never before approached in the valley.
