

USED BELL ROPE AS TOURNIQUET

Engineer Stanchd Flow of
Blood After Accident on
Level Crossing in Mont-
real.

Montreal, April 7.—Quick action on the part of a G. T. R. locomotive engineer Wednesday morning probably saved the life of W. B. Clark, 40 years of age, of 221 Westmount Boulevard, whose leg was severed by the train in the engineer's charge, at the St. Remi street crossing of the Grand Trunk Railway. The engineer immediately brought his train to a stop and cutting off his bell rope, made a tourniquet which he applied to Mr. Clark's bleeding limb and partly stopped the flow of blood. The leg had been severed below the knee, and when the victim was admitted to the Montreal General Hospital it was found necessary to amputate above the knee. Mr. Clark was reported last night as resting comfortably. The accident occurred when Mr. Clark was on his way to his office at the plant of C. O. Clark and Brothers, Bell Manufacturers. The gates were down at the crossing, but Mr. Clark stepped under them onto the track. He was waiting for one train going city-wards to pass, on the next track, when he saw another train, which was shunting, bearing down on him from the opposite direction. He made an effort to jump out of the way, but his foot slipped and he fell. His right leg lay across a rail and it was severed.

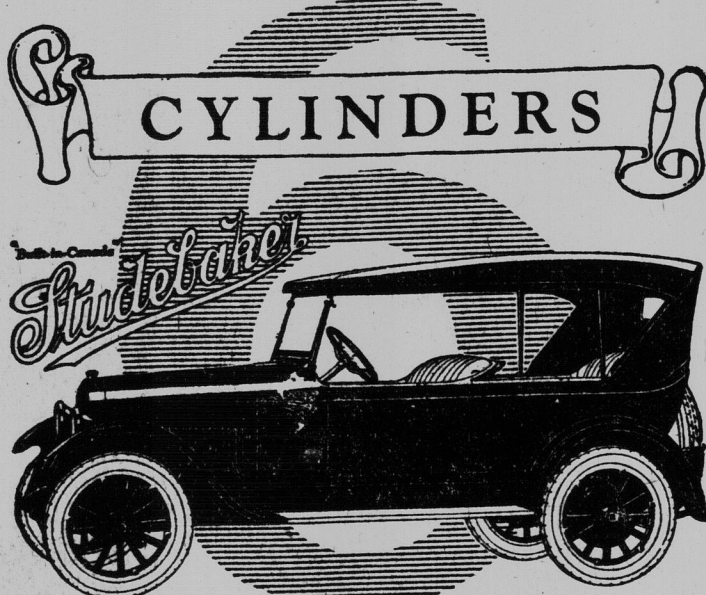
Sought a Hobby While Convalescing From Accident

London, April 7.—Lord Carnarvon, whose sixteen years of work among the tombs of Egypt has ended so tragically, became interested in Egyptology by a curious chance. During a convalescence which followed a motor accident he asked Sir Ernest Rudge, keeper of the Egyptian and Assyrian antiquities at the British Museum, to suggest a hobby which he could follow. Sir Ernest persuaded him to become interested in Egyptology, and from that time onward Lord Carnarvon devoted his time to Egyptian research. Lord Carnarvon had a passion for adventure. Before he was 25 he had been around the world three times. He was a prominent figure on the turf, a pioneer of motoring and of aviation. Big game hunting was one of his hobbies, and he liked yachting. In intervals between traveling Lord Carnarvon lived mainly at his Berkshire seat, where he improved the shooting to such an extent that the Highclere pheasants became famous. 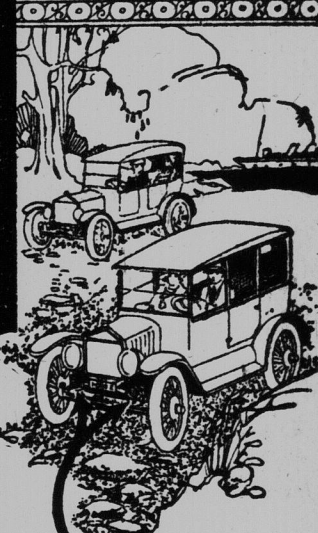
KIRKWOOD UNHURT IN FORCED LANDING

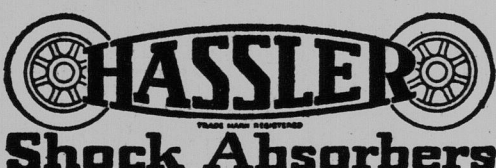
