

GERTRUDE EDERLE AGAIN TRIES CHANNEL SWIM

NEW YORK GIRL HALF WAY OVER AFTER 6 HOURS

Dover Reports Water Rough With Wind Backing Ebb Tide

CAP GRIS NEZ, Aug. 6.—Gertrude Ederle, the New York swimmer, started at 7:05 o'clock this morning, in an attempt to swim the English Channel. The weather conditions when she took her plunge were fine. The sea was smooth and the weather fairly warm, with the temperature at 61 degrees Fahrenheit.

At noon, about five hours after the start, Miss Ederle was nine miles out. Her position was good and the weather was unchanged, with a southwest wind.

ROUGH OFF DOVER.

DOVER, Eng., (I. P. M.)—With Gertrude Ederle about half way across the channel, after six hours in the water, conditions on this side were unfavorable. A strong southwest wind, blowing against the ebb tide was kicking up a bad sea.

STARTS OUT STRONG.

It was a grim and determined swimmer that entered the water this morning, in sharp contrast to last year, when she dove off as if on a holiday. With set face she walked into the channel from the sandy beach instead of diving from the rocks of the cape as before.

She barely acknowledged the cheers of the few onlookers, but walked briskly until the water reached her waist, and then launched off with a steady crawl of 28 strokes to the minute, making for the ebbing tide at Alcester, 200 yards away.

She was going very strong, and her trainer, T. W. Burgess, was already warning her, "Take your time, Miss Ederle."

Today's attempt was not Miss Ederle's first introduction to this rough waterway lying between the coasts of France and England. This one time amateur champion, who is now a professional, tried last summer, and was within 6 1/2 miles from the chalk cliffs of Dover, when she became exhausted and collapsed in the arms of the Egyptian swimmer Helmy, who was plugging into the water to rescue her. She attributed her defeat to large quantities of salt water swallowed repeatedly during two miles of the journey through a choppy sea.

WILL SWIM FROM DOVER.

DOVER, Eng., Aug. 6.—Miss Gertrude Ederle, the New Rochelle, N. Y. woman who early in the week came within two miles of swimming the English Channel from Dover to Cap Gris Nez, undoubtedly will swim again from Dover when she is able to attempt. She thinks that as the water is warmer near the French coast, it is of great advantage to swim from cold into warmer water at a time when a swimmer is nearing exhaustion.

JURY INDICTS 27 NEW YORK DOCTORS

Druggists Also in List of Charge of Conspiracy to Violate Prohibition Act

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Twenty-seven doctors, 80 druggists, 17 whiskey agents and four corporations have been indicted by the July Federal Grand Jury for conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act. This action was taken as a result of a drive against so-called "prescription bootlegging" which, it is alleged, caused the withdrawal by druggists last year of 500,000 gallons of whiskey over and above the quantity which legal prescriptions had been issued.

It was also said that possibly 4,000,000 spurious liquor prescriptions were issued.

Fourteen indictments were found, each alleging a separate conspiracy. The defendants were grouped according to single or related transactions in particular batches of prescriptions. One indictment charged that Samuel Marcus, Louis Finkelstein and Henry J. Kust, druggists, committed perjury in their voluntary testimony before the Grand Jury in their own behalf.

Those indicted included only a very few of the 27 doctors, six druggists and four whiskey agents, for whom warrants were issued March 15 last on similar charges.

AUTO LEAPS INTO RIVER UPON LAUNCH

Speeds Downhill as Brakes Give Way and Plunges Into Ohio

CINCINNATI, Aug. 6.—Like two Roman gladiators providing sport in the arena, an automobile and a gasoline launch raced down a hill in the Ohio River here, each delivering a death blow.

The automobile belonged to Albert Gleason, Newport, Ky., and the launch was the property of Thomas Hoskings, caretaker of the Newport Boat Club. Gleason had perched his car on a hill leading to the water, the brakes gave way and the car sped down the hill.

The launch was moving into its mooring when the automobile leaped toward it. The land lubber struck the prow of the row boat and it went down with a hole torn in the prow. Hoskings was hurled into the river, but was unhurt.

The automobile got the worst of it. The motor was broken and the front axle bent almost double. Honors went to the launch, whose owner announced that he would repair it. Hundreds of persons on the river bank applauded the spectacle.

N. Y. BARBER GIVEN HOLIDAY IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—George Wagner, a barber employed in the Postal Telegraph Building, 233 Broadway, has called for Europe on the steamer Albert Ballin on a two months' vacation. His trip was financed by William H. English, banker, of 120 Broadway, as a reward for twenty-one years of faithful barbering.

Wagner has been the banker's private barber, having him every day, and has accompanied him on all his business trips, whether to the Pacific coast or to Florida. On Sunday the barber goes to Red Bank, N. J., to shave the financier at his home. One of Wagner's fellow-barbers will act as a substitute during his trip abroad.

Wagner was accompanied to Europe by his wife. They will visit Alsace-Lorraine, where Wagner was born. Mr. English was formerly a vice-president of the Empire Trust Company and is the director of many financial institutions.

GIRL CONFESSES

CAMDEN, N. J., Aug. 6.—A bobbed-haired blonde bandit who, with a youthful companion, threatened to shoot Jacob Roisman, Philadelphia lawyer, while he was giving them a lift in his automobile, has confessed her part in the hold-up, according to Assistant Prosecutor Joseph Varablow.

Rev. J. J. Burke Defends Mexican Catholics

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Catholic bishops and priests in Mexico are demanding only the rights guaranteed to Mexicans under the national constitution of that country, Father John J. Burke, secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, said in a statement today, referring to reports that the bishops had appealed to President Calles for restoration of their citizenship. Father Burke said the reason was apparent, adding: "What are the civil rights denied to Mexican bishops and priests? They are denied the liberty of speech and press, of assembly and petition, equality before the law, and trial by jury, the right to property either as individuals or in corporations, the right to vote and hold office, the right to exercise their profession, excepting under sufferance and by executive clemency of not only federal officers, but of every village authority."

MILLION DOLLAR ESTATE IS SOUGHT

Kerry Man Writes to Ontario Priest in Effort to Find Fortune

MADOC, Ont., Aug. 6.—Believing he has a legal right to a large sum of money left by the O'Neill Griffin family, Thomas O'Neill, Milltown, County Kerry, Ireland, has written to Rev. J. P. O'Riordan, of Madoc, requesting him to try to locate friends of Ellen Catherine O'Neill-Griffin, who recently died in Canada, leaving a sum of money estimated at \$1,000,000, news of which O'Neill received through the columns of the "Kerryman," circulated in County Kerry.

O'Neill, in his letter, claims that Shamus O'Neill-Griffin was his father's uncle, and if he can prove this, he believes he will have a just claim to the fortune left Miss O'Neill-Griffin, who was a daughter of Shamus O'Neill-Griffin, according to the claimant, the former adding "Griffin" to his name because it was probably his mother's name.

CARBARN BANDITS LOSE HOPE OF LIFE

Waltham Trio to go to Electric Chair—Governor Declines to Intervene

BOSTON, Aug. 6.—The Waltham carbarn bandits must go to the electric chair some time during the week beginning at midnight Sunday, when John J. Devereux, Edward J. Heinelein and John J. McLaughlin, convicted of murder in the first degree of James Feneau, 67-year-old watchman employed by the Eastern Middlesex Street Railway, Oct. 5, 1923, lost their fight for commutation of their sentences to life imprisonment when Governor Fuller, after a thorough review of the case, announced: "There is no sufficient justification for my intervention."

In reaching his decision the Governor was fortified by a recommendation of Chairman Frank A. Brooks of the State Parole Board, who interviewed the condemned men in their cells at the East Cambridge jail, examined thoroughly the records in the case, and reported that he could find nothing that would entitle them to consideration from the Governor.

RAISE FUNDS TO FIGHT SOVIETISM

Knights of Columbus Protest Over Mexico Religious Difficulties

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 6.—The Knights of Columbus, in annual convention yesterday, unanimously adopted a statement protesting against the policy of President Calles in the religious situation in Mexico.

The statement called the attention of the United States Government to remind it that the representatives of Calles have insulted and degraded and expelled American citizens, men and women, under circumstances that are abhorrent to our conception of constitutional government.

"We warn our fellow American citizens," the statement said, "that they cannot endure at their very doorstep, with impunity, the Russianizing of Mexico."

We further point to the significance of the patronage bestowed upon these military despots by the continuance of recognition and particularly by the discriminating favoritism shown to Calles by the continuance of the arms embargo, which makes the Calles ascendancy possible.

"We hereby authorize our supreme board of directors to assess our membership to the extent of \$1,000,000 of campaign of education," the statement said, "to the end that politics of Soviet Russia shall be eliminated from the Philosophy of American Life."
