"I had a hard time to get these four, but I think there will be more soon. I pass the paper around among my neighbors, and the scales are falling off their eyes."—Oxdrift, Ont.

"The offs in the circulation are sad. We must, as the sailors say, be in the doggerals. I hope a breeze will spring up that will move us along. Enclosed find subs."—St. John, N.B.

"Please send me four sub cards. I'll try hard to give them away. Wages and brains are so low in this town that you couldn't squeeze a quarter out of the poor slaves."—Campbellford, Ont.

"Enclosed please find \$2.50 cents being for subs and \$1.50 for Battery. I have a hard time to rustle subs here. There are seven of us altogether, and only one who speaks and reads English."—Alberta comrade.

"Please send me four sub cards. This is my first start. The boys here think conditions should be bettered so I get a few subs. We are eighteen miles from the nearest town, so the boys have a lot of time on their hands to think."—Riondel, B.C.

"It seems pretty hard getting subs, so many out of work here, but I got four." This is a message from Brockville, Ont., Comrade. The capitalist papers are sporting about prosperity. They cover up the ragged army of unemployed that is spreading from coast to coast.

"I am new in the fight, but will fight with all my might, as I am tired of being a slave. Enclosed please find seven subs to Cotton's Weekly, this being my first attempt to gather them in. We have the pot boiling out here in B.C., and we are going to keep it so."—South Vancouver, B.C.

"I enclose \$2 for subs and cards. We all feel encouraged over the success of our lecture from Comrade Simpson. The audience of over three hundred seemed impressed with what they heard. Our movement here is bound to be respected and treated more seriously."—H. E. Bushey, Kingston, Ont.

"I got mad the other day, and while the spell lasted I ran down these four. I'll tell you what happened. A farmer was coming in to town with a load of grain. There is a hill to climb a little way out of Gull Lake on the south side. The farmer was resting his horses in the middle of the hill, when an automobile came up. He was told mighty quick to get out of the way. He said he would as soon as his horses were rested. Before he had time to say another word, a policeman jumped out of the auto and arrested the farmer. That is why I got hot and started to hustle, for anyone can see that if we do not awaken our class they will soon have our hides and all."—L. G. Bergquist, Gull Lake, Sask.

"Enclosed please find four subs. I went up to Ingelwood to see my brother, with the above result. Ingelwood, Ont., is a proper slave pen. Everything is controlled by two men. There is a woollen mill which pays girls fifty cents a day, and pays the men \$1.10. There is the brickyard, and there is the railway and one church. They used to have an hotel, but the labor skimmers pressed for local option. Just to show how the men fare at the hands of these petty slave drivers, a few of the slaves

congregated outside the church while the service was on, talking amongst themselves. There was one complaint to the preacher, who was also the magistrate. Of course he summoned them all, and fined them \$50. I spoke to the villagers about this, and they thought it all right. So I gave them a line of talk with the above result."—Toronto comrade.

In Berlin Too

"I tell you, Cotton, money is scarce. Most factories in this burg are working eight hours a day, and quite a number on seven. This is just before the Christmas season, when times are supposed to be the best. Overproduction."

Thus writes a Berlin, Ont., comrade. Berlin slave pens work usually ten hours a day. The slaves get poor pay and cannot buy back what they produce. The plutes are stuffed with surplus on the wealth produced by labor, and cannot gorge any more. Hence factories go on short time. Hours are cut and pay is cut in proportion.

It is all right, in the eyes of the masters, to cut the hours of labor of the workers as long as the pay goes down in proportion. But a horrible howl of anguish arises from their parasite throats when the workers demand shorter hours with the same pay.

And they go into paroxysms of despair when the Socialists demand that the workers get all they produce.

Cotton's not Allowed in Jail

Nanaimo, B.C., Nov. 16th, 1913 Dear Comrade, excuse delay in answering. Came out of jail yesterday, \$2,000 bail. Your paper is not allowed in jail.—J. Place.

This is a note Cotton's has received from Comrade Jack Place, M.P.P. who was flung onto jail and held without bail because he stood with the striking miners. Canadian labor has shown such a spirit of protest that the capitalist jackal judges and politicians got scared and crawled.

The masters know Cotton's is dangerous in the hands of the working class, so they refuse to allow it to circulate among the jailed victims of their tyranny.

STILL DOWN

The circulation is still going down. But Cotton's finances are improving.

You will remember that last year the subscription rate was twenty-five cents a year. Now it is twenty-five cents for forty weeks.

At the present time we are having double-offs. The subscriptions put on twelve months ago are expiring with the subscriptions put on forty weeks ago. During the present 3 months subs put on during six months are going off.

591 ones multiplied by forty weeks show our circulation to be at a rate of almost 24,000 a year. Were these subs going on for fifty-two weeks, our circulation would be on a basis of over 30,000.

The decreased circulation is keeping our expenses lower and keeping with our income, getting on a sound foundation.

We would like to see the circulation going to the 50,000 mark, but we know the comrades of the firing line are doing their best and striving to show their fellow slaves the light of freedom. We know that the slave victims of capitalism are as anxious as we are to see Cotton's increased in power.

Cash Receipts at Cotton's

Cash receipts at Cotton's for the week ending Nov. 21st were \$142.05, of which \$134.95 was for the spread of Cotton's.

Cash receipts have been, Saturday, Nov. 22nd, \$8.75; Monday, Nov. 24, \$77.15; Tuesday, \$36.96; Wednesday, \$10.80; Thursday, \$45.75. Of the \$179.35 received during the six days, \$136.45 was for the spread of Cotton's.

During Nov., 1912, the cash receipts from the paper were \$498.30. To date, (Nov. 28th) the receipts this year in November have been \$610. This brings our receipts from the paper to within \$250 of the business we did last year during the 11 months. A special effort during December by the comrades will put our receipts for the paper ahead of last year.
