

FOUR CH ILDREN SAVED FROM FIRE

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Dec. 21—Four colored children ranging in age from eight months to six years, were rescued half overcome by smoke by hoseman Henry McLane at a fire in a structure occupied by 36 colored families on Summer street here tonight. The children were huddled together, very much frightened and partially suffocated in a room on the third floor, their presence in the house being made known to the firemen by the mother of two of them. The rescue was made by means of a ladder and was very spectacular, McLane succeeding in finding the children and passing them one by one to other firemen outside who took them to the ground in safety. The other occupants of the house escaped unaided.

The fire loss was slight and was confined to the cellar, in which it originated.
