### SPORTING MATTERS

### ST. JOSEPH'S AND F.M.A.'S TIED

One of the most interesting games of ball this season in the Inter-Society League contest was played last evening on the Shamrock grounds, when the St. Joseph's and F. M. A. teams tied with 5 runs each. There was a good sized crowd of spectators, and there was quite a lot of excitement.

More the game started, while practicing in front of the grand stand, Frank Greig, one of the St. Joseph's pitchers, was hit under the right eye by a batted ball and had to be assisted to a doctor, where two stitches were taken in the cut. The wound was a very painful one.

It was twenty minutes after eight o'clock when the game was started, the St. Joseph's going to bat first. Simpson hit out to John McDermott at third base, and Greig went out on a foul fly to the catcher.

For the F. M. A.'s the first man up went out on a fly, and the next two men struck out.

In the second inning Harris opened with a snappy two bagger to left field and scored when McDonald, the next batter, placed a two bagger into the centre field. McCaffery hit to short stop, and Greig struck out.

For the F. M. A.'s F. Hazel drew a base and stole second. Joe McDermott reached first on a miff of Simpson's, although the ball was a difficult one to catch. McDermott went to third.

White struck out. Kelly to bat, landed a safe one in the centre field and Joe McDermott and McGovern romped over the home plate, amid much applause. John McDermott drew a base on balls and went to second on a wild pitch. Kelly stole third nicely and when Greig threw to second there was no one there to receive the ball, and Kelly scored before the ball could be returned to the plate.

Hazel struck out. Riley went out to first base and retired the side. This left the F. M. A.'s 5 scores to the St. Joseph's 4.

In the fourth inning McCaffery opened by hitting out to second base, O'Neill hit to Bent who threw badly to first and the batter went to third on the error. This practically lost the game for the F. M. A.'s, for the next batter was Buckley, who hit a difficult one to Simpson at first, got out himself, but the play allowed O'Neill to cross the plate and tie the score. Greig was next up. He singled to left field, stole second, and reached third on Simpson's ball to short, and started for home. The little catcher slid nicely to the plate, and to many it looked as if he scored, but he was called out on the close decision of the umpire, who declared him out on the play, first to catcher. If he had scored the St. Joseph's would have been one ahead, but his being declared out retired the side.

The F. M. A.'s went out in 1-2-3 order and the game was called, 5 to 5, on account of darkness. The following is the tabulated score and summary of the game:

### CANADA'S COMMERCE CONTINUES TO EXPAND

Big Increase in Imports for Two Months But a Falling off in Exports.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 13.—Canada's trade continues to outgrow that of the first two months of the present fiscal year there has been an increase of no less an amount than \$7,525,821 in exports and a year ago. There is some falling off in exports owing to the freight blockade, the late opening of the St. Lawrence and the longshoremen's strike at Montreal. There was a heavy increase in imports and a likewise increase in customs collections. For the two months, the duties totalled \$9,588,691 an increase of \$1,533,281. There was a decrease of \$5,255,222,884 in imports. The only item of exports which shows an increase is that of the fur products which is about three-quarters of a million greater than for the same months of the previous year. The forest products decreased by a million and a quarter fisheries a quarter of a million, animals and birds products a million and a half, manufactures half a million and agricultural products two and a half millions decrease.

The death occurred about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon of Francis D. Hunter, of Montreal, at the residence of his son-in-law, aged 55 years. Until four or five years ago Mr. Hunter resided in this city. He was employed with George Carvell and also with his brother, Robert Hunter. He is survived by seven children—Mrs. Wm. B. Dickson, of Hopewell; Mrs. L.C. Wortman, of Wolfville, wife of Prof. Wortman; Mrs. Wm. Cradell, of Montreal, at whose home he died; Wm. Hunter, at home; Mrs. Mary McEade, of the States. The burial will be in the United States.

MRS. MARY McEADE.  
The death took place at noon yesterday, at her home, No. 155 Bruce street, of Mrs. Mary McEade, wife of William McEade. She deceased is survived by three sons, Messrs. John and William, of Brunswick, and Christie, at home; also two daughters, Mrs. Donnelly, at Barseville, and Miss Teresa, at home.

CHARLES MERRITT.  
Charles Merritt, who died in the Woodstock Hospital last week, was a devoted and enthusiastic chemist, and was buried in the Methodist cemetery on Saturday afternoon after services at the church and graves were conducted by Rev. H. O. Alder. Mr. Merritt was the only son of the late David F. Merritt, collector of customs, and was about 32 years of age. He leaves one sister, Mrs. Marjoram Brayley of Montreal.—Woodstock Dispatch.

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 13.—The death of James Mansfield Harper, occurred recently at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Snowdon, Salmon Falls, N. B. Deceased had reached the ripe old age of ninety-two. He was a native of Sackville and formerly conducted a business at Middle Sackville, now owned by Morice Brothers. He leaves his daughter, two sons survive, Henry of Sackville and Abram of River Hebert, N. S.

ZENO BARNETT.

Miss Mary Draper of 48 Hornfield street received word yesterday of the death of her brother, Melville, which occurred in British Columbia. He was 37 years of age.

Mrs. Rosa V. Weaver, Los Angeles, Cal. arrived in Sussex last week to see her son who was recently operated on for appendicitis. Mr. Weaver, it will be remembered, was taken suddenly ill while with the Toy Makers Company and prompt treatment was necessary. Mrs. Weaver, learning her son's condition, left at once on the long journey to be present at his bedside. The patient is progressing favorably and will shortly be able to leave Sussex.—Sussex Record.

Captain J. F. Ewing, representing the underwriters of the cargo of the wrecked American schooner Alma, went down to Gooseberry Cove, near Musquash yesterday, in the tug Lillie, to bring the wreck to this city. The schooner was taken in tow and arrived in the city at five o'clock last evening. She is now lying in Lover Cove slip. A large part of the cargo of laths which the vessel carried, had been washed away after she was abandoned, but what remains will be discharged. It is doubtful if the vessel is of sufficient value to be raised, but the will not be determined until after a close inspection.

The cabin who were summoned to the Mayor's office for four o'clock yesterday afternoon to consider the question of a revision of the license laws, did not appear, the only one present besides the Mayor himself, being Alderman B. Skinner. Alderman Skinner also was out of the city, being in Montreal to attend his son's wedding, while Ald. The man who was found drowned in the east inlet on the within price-reach of the Oromocto has been identified as John Cotton, an English emigrant, who came here about a year ago and hung around this city for some time. The identification was established at an inquest held by Coroner Gova of St. Ann's.

A despatch from Chicago announces that at the commencement exercises of the University of Illinois yesterday, the degree of Doctor of Philosophy was conferred upon Rev. Wm. M. Hill, M. A. The C.S. Packard Dredging Co. of Boston, has sold its big dredge and two scoops to the Dominion Dredging Co. This is one of the machines suggested to the government by the city as available for purchase, and which it is understood was only recently held under contract by G. S. Mayes, of this city, and has a capacity for working to a depth of 17 feet. The dredge should be in operation by the end of the month. It will commence work immediately.

"You should have pulled out the plank," were the last words that passed the lips of Michael Gillen, who was crushed to death last Saturday night when the Royal Bank building fell. The evidence of Charles Ross, who was working with Gillen at the time of the accident, given before Coroner Berryman last evening, went to show that the removal of a plank from beneath the door caused it to fall. It also showed that the plank was removed by an Englishman named Jones, against the protests of both Ross and Gillen.
