

NEW SOURCE OF WEALTH FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Continued from page 1. The house met at 3 o'clock. Mr. Munro presented the report of the Municipalities Committee. Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented the report of the Law Committee.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of bills respecting taxation and water rates of the Humphrey Unshrinkable Underwear Ltd., and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. in Moncton.

Hon. Mr. McLeod submitted a statement of the bonded debt of the City and County of Saint John and the annual report of the Hotel Dieu at Tracadie.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act incorporating the City of Moncton and relating to the salvage corps and fire police of Moncton.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented the petition of the Charlotte County Council in favor of a bill to fix the valuation for assessment purposes on the Canadian Sarco Co. Ltd.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced bills respecting the executive council and the clerk of the executive council.

Dr. Price presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to the levying of rates and taxes in the City of Moncton.

The House went into committee with Mr. Stewart (Gloucester) in the chair and considered the bill to amend the act respecting the Salvage Act Progress was reported.

The House went into committee with Mr. White (Victoria) in the chair, and agreed to the bill relating to the estate of Lewis H. Fisher, of the town of Woodstock, also a bill to confirm in Elizabeth Connacher the title to certain real estate in the town of Campbellton.

The House went into committee with Mr. Young in the chair, and considered the bill respecting the oyster fisheries of the province.

Mr. Sheridan said that the oyster question in Kent county was a great one. The fishermen were up in arms against any leasing of oyster beds.

There were between three and four hundred men in Kent county who worked more or less at oyster fishing, and who seemed to be afraid that live or producing beds would be leased.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said that he could understand the feeling of uneasiness that his honorable friend from Kent had referred to as existing in that county on account of the fact that a very large portion of the live oyster beds of the province were located in waters adjacent to, and in the county of Kent.

He had but one objection to the suggestion of his honorable friend, and that was that it did not seem to him good legislation to pass a bill applying to the province as a whole except one portion. He had the greatest amount of sympathy with the man who had practically grown up on the water and thus secured his means of livelihood, and he desired to make it as clear as it possibly could be, that there was no intention on the part of the government to deal with anything but barren areas.

If the honorable member had no objection he was prepared to accept this amendment to the bill. However, there was one feature that might cause a difficulty, and that was that two areas, one in the county of Kent and the other in the county of Northumberland, that had been leased by the Federal government in the past, and under an agreement between the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and this government, been handed over to the province. Consequently it was the duty of the government to deal with these two areas as they deemed most wise.

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) said that he believed it would be a great misfortune to accept the amendment as proposed. There was no doubt whatever that the leasing of barren ground would be most beneficial.

The section was allowed to stand for second reading. Hon. Mr. Fleming moved to amend section 7 of part 1, of the bill to provide that such rules and regulations as he deemed necessary to carry this act into effect, should be published in the Royal Gazette for at least thirty days before becoming effective, so that if there were any reasons why the regulations should be changed, there would be an opportunity to have them presented.

Mr. Carter thought that provision should be made in section 5 to refer vest properties in the Crown at a mutual agreement between the lessor and the lessee of the individual leases had expired.

Hon. Mr. Fleming considered that the words of the section met the objection of the section. The object of the section was that the government should fix what was a reasonable rental at all other by way of increase rental or royalty for a period of twenty years, but they did not presume to anticipate what the rights would be worth for the following twenty years. It seemed clear under the section that the right vested in leases would terminate at the end of twenty years and would then revert to the property of the government.

Mr. Baxter said it was very clear that the property must revert to the province the moment the lease to the individual owner came to an end.

Thinks Territory Too Large. Mr. Mahoney said he did not think the Canadian Oyster Company should have the right to a monopoly of the whole shore at Cape Tormentine and Tidnish river. Hon. members from Westmorland county felt that the company would be justified in taking ten miles of the shore or 10,000 acres. He considered it wise to amend the first section of part 2 of the bill, to provide that the government would have the right to dispose of part of the rights referred to.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said he did not think any harm would come from embodying the suggestion of his honorable friend in the bill. The matter was one that must of necessity, be dealt with between the Canadian Oyster Company and the government. He could understand and applaud the idea in which his honorable friend spoke with regard to the people residing in Westmorland, but the question was, could the government propose to do special things for a certain company, and where, in return, that company bind itself to do certain things.
