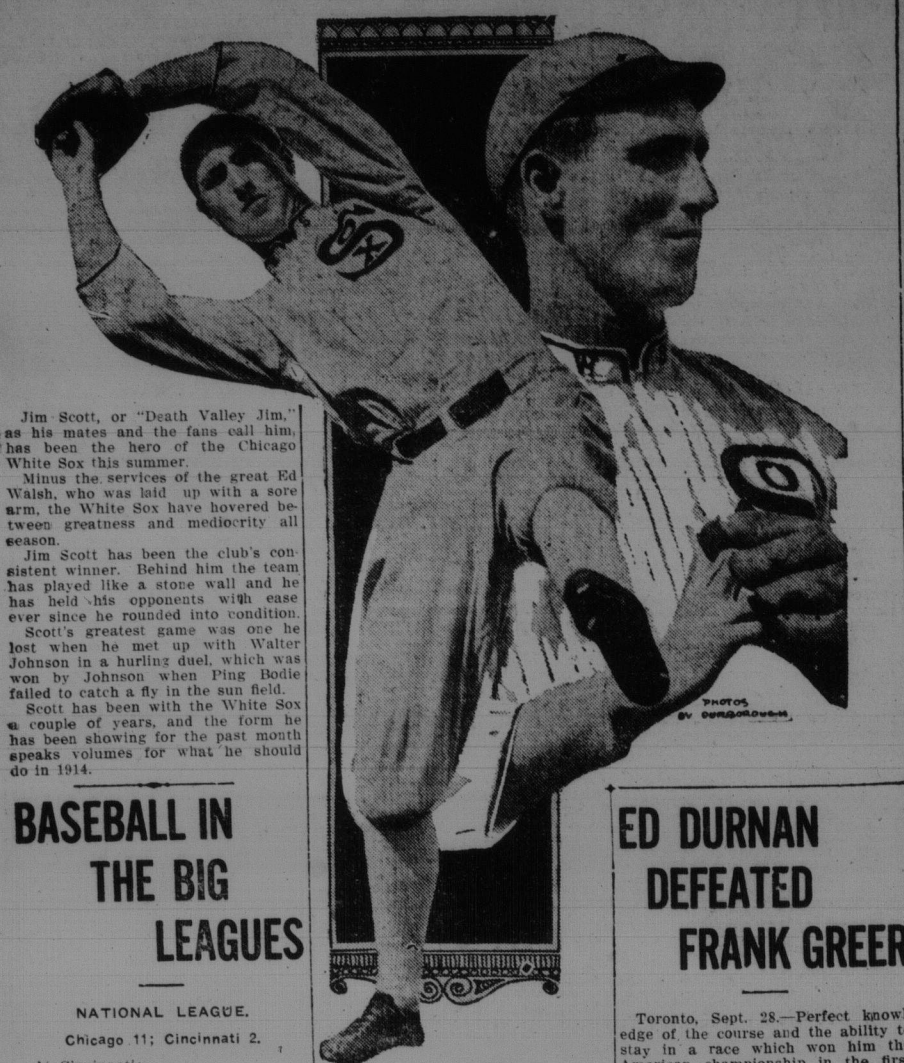

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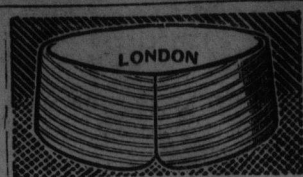

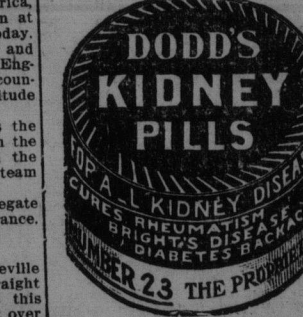

Rt. Rev. Bishop Worrell Tells Large Audience in Opera House.

SERMON ON MOUNT MORE THAN A POE

Mass Meeting, Yesterday Afternoon, Under Auspices of Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

That Christianity is not being today, but that, in spite of the fact that it is not practical, it has the power if accepted in faith of regenerating the conditions we are living under. This was the message of Bishop Worrell, who spoke at a well-attended mass meeting of men held in the Opera House yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. His Lordship's subject was "Jesus Christ and the Mount," and he declared that the sermon on the Mount was the cornerstone of the Kingdom of Christ, that the chief responsibility rested upon the Church and churchmen today was to apply that constitution to the affairs of the world.

Bishop Richardson acted as chairman of the meeting and conducted opening exercises. St. Mary's was in attendance and furnished, etc. On the platform were a number of clergymen of various denominations.

In opening Bishop Worrell said that the large attendance was a sign of great things to come, and that it was a privilege to speak to such an audience on the subject of Jesus Christ and the Mount. He then went on to explain the meaning of the Mount, and how it was a symbol of the Kingdom of Christ.
