per cent., or about 15, miles of Maine's territory eleven of the sixteen without civil organization. These are Aroostook, Franklin, Knox, Lincoln, Oxford, Piscataquis, Sagadahoc and Washington. The greater territory is in the north of the state in the counties of Penobscot, Piscataquis, et, but there are considerable parts of it in Franklin, Hancock and Washington counties. There is no unorganized territory in the organized territories. There are 20 cities, 45 towns and 15 plantations, while in the unorganized territory there are as many as 644 full sized townships, seven strips, two tracts, two points, one patent, 110 islands and 148 islands. This is somewhat larger in extent than the states of Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut combined.

There are no local officials in the county, all public business is transacted through state and county. The state taxes of various kinds, the regular state tax on real estate, personal property tax and foreign trade tax are assessed from the auditor's office and collected by the sheriff's department. The money for school purposes is raised through the office of the state superintendent of public schools. The maintenance and repairs of roads are under the charge of the commissioners of several counties. All school districts are directed through the office of the superintendent of public schools who is the general agent for unincorporated townships and as a director of school administration this office is the largest in area in the state.
