CLERGYMAN AT A TEACHER'S IN-
STITUTE.

but his habits were remarkably quiet

sciously to himself, made the noble boy
a perfect model of genuine good man-

kind heart. When last I saw him
thirty years had passed, and I was on
a visit to the West. The boy had be-
come a distinguished lawyer and states-
man; but his bow, and his smile, and his
kind greeting, were just the same as
those of the barefooted boy with the poor
hat.

THE GRASS.
Consider that we owe merely to the
meadow grass, to the covering of the dark
ground by that glorious enamel, and the
company of those soft, and countless, and
peaceful green blades, the sweetest of
all things. The grass is the friend of the
poor, but for a little time the thoughts
of all that we ought to recognise in those
words. All spring and summer is in them,
the walks by silent, scented paths, the
rest in noon-day heat, the joy of birds
and flocks, the power of all shepherd
life and meditation, the life of sunlight
upon the world, falling in emerald streaks
and falling in soft, blue shadows, where
else it would have struck upon the dark
mould, or scorched fast, pastures be-
cause the paving brook, soft banks and
kisses of lowly hills, by the banks of
downy oaks, by the blue line of lifted
sea, crisp lawns all dim with early dew
or smooth in evening warmth of barred
sunshine, dented by happy feet, and soft-
ening in the fall the sound of loving voices
all these are summed up in these simple
words; and these are not all. We may
not measure to the full the depth the heav-
enly gift, in our own land; though, as we
think of it longer, the infinite of that
meadow openness, Shakespeare's peculiar
joy would open on us more and more, yet
we have it but in part. Go out in the
spring time among the meadows that
slope from the shores of the Swiss lakes
to the roots of their lower mountains.
Their mingled with the taller gentians,
and the white narcissus, the grass grows
deep and deep, as you follow the
windy paths, beneath a sun that
all reeled and dim with blossoms, pinks,
that forever drop and rise over the
green banks and mounds sweeping down in
scattered invitation, steep to the blue
water, studded here and there with new
mossy heaps, filling all the air with faint
sweetness, look up towards the high
or holy, where the waves of everlasting
green roll silently into their long, pale
among the shadows of the pines, and
may perhaps at last know the meaning
of those great words of the 147th Psalm,
"The meadow grass to grow upon the
mountains." There are also general lessons
on the subject of the grass, which are
not only connected with the subject,
but which are not at all general.
Observe the peculiar characters of
the grass, which adapt it especially for

the service of man, its apparent humility
and cheerfulness. Its humility, in that it
seems created only for lowest service,
appointed to be trodden on, and fed upon.
Its cheerfulness, in that it seems to exult
under all kinds of violence and suffering.
You roll it and it is stronger the next
day; you mow it and it multiplies it
shoot, as if it were grateful; you tread
upon it, and it only sends up richer per-
fume. Spring comes, and it rejoices
with all the earth, glowing with variegated
depth of fruitful strength. Winter comes,
and though it will not mock its fellow
plants by growing then, it will not pine
and mourn, and turn colorless or leaf-
less as they. It is always green, and is
only the brighter and gay for the
hazy frost.—John Ruskin.
