VICTIM INTENDED GOING TO ENGLAND
Mrs. Louis Warlow Would Have Sailed in a Few Days.

WINDSOR, March 21.—Mrs. Louis Warlow, who was murdered by her husband, John Warlow, at Walkerville Saturday night, was buried this afternoon in Windsor Grove Cemetery.

Following the formal viewing of the remains by a jury this morning, the jury adjourned until Tuesday night when an inquest will take place.

Chief of Police Smith, of Walkerville, today took possession of a letter written by a sister of Mrs. Warlow living in England.

Mrs. Warlow had intended leaving for England in a few days time. The letter reached Walkerville today and will be opened and read by Chief Smith at the inquest.

At the Hotel Dieu tonight, Warlow was reported to be making satisfactory progress from a self-inflicted wound following the shooting of his wife. It is expected that he will be released from the hospital in a few days and will be arraigned on a formal charge.

HOMESTEADER MURDERED.
EDMONTON, Y.B., March 21.—Following a dispute over ownership of a hayrack, Edward Thew is dead from a bullet wound in his neighbor, Clair Johnson, in the provincial police cells here facing a charge of murder. Both men were homesteaders in the Entwistle district.

TRUSTEES WANT EXTRA \$130,000 FOR COLLEGIATE

Total of \$575,000. Means Half Sarnia Taxes For Education.

SARNIA, March 21.—The board of education applied to the Sarnia city council tonight for an additional sum of \$130,000 for the new collegiate institute, making the total \$575,000. The original estimate of the cost of a new school was \$200,000. A special meeting of the city council will be called to deal with the matter.

If the amount requested is granted, it will mean that 50 per cent of the city tax money will be expended for school purposes.

Mr. Wester, M.P.P., who was asked by the city council to introduce a bill making it compulsory upon property holders to notify the assessor of all sales and transfers of property, wrote that it was too late in the session to introduce the bill, the private bills committee having completed its work, but that the matter had been referred to the provincial secretary, and would be considered as early as possible.

Isolation Hospital.
The board of health requested that an isolation hospital be provided for the city, and recommended a vacant house on Essex street for the purpose. Ald. Thomas Cook objected because the location is in a residential district, and no action was taken on the recommendation tonight.

The postmaster suggested an amendment, approved by the building inspector, to the building bylaw, that in constructing all new houses receptacles for mail be provided.

William Allair, who at last session of the council offered to act as assessor for \$1,400, tonight raised his terms, and now wants \$1,800.

Street Lighting Surplus.
The Sarnia hydro department notified the council that a check for \$255, the street lighting surplus, will be sent to the council. Peter Blackburn was re-appointed city treasurer. A month's vacation was voted to J. D. Stewart, city clerk for 33 years, and his daughter, Miss Marjorie Stewart, was appointed to act in his absence.

J. A. Baird, city engineer, resigned, and coupled with his resignation, which was accepted, a recommendation that all committees handling city construction work be placed under one centralized head.

Will Attend Conference.
The mayor was authorized to attend the final session of the Great Western Conference in Detroit on March 30.

The council will communicate with the Grand Trunk Railway board for the purpose of securing the establishment of a bird sanctuary on Grand Trunk property north of the city.

ADMITTS THEFT FROM LETTER
Postoffice Clerks Pleads Guilty On Very Serious Charge.

ST. THOMAS, March 21.—Pleading guilty to stealing \$2.25 from a letter addressed to T. Eaton Company, Charles R. Hardy, a clerk in the local postoffice, was remanded for a week to the county jail today when he was sentenced. Complaints reaching the authorities that remittances sent from Toronto had not been received, led to his destination, a decoy letter with an inclosure of money, marked by the postmaster, was placed in the mail box, and later its contents were found on Hardy. He was immediately taken in charge.

Blaze at M. C. R.
Nominal damage was done by a blaze in the electrical room of the M. C. R. early this morning. The fire department put the blaze out before it made any headway.

Miss Mary Boughner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Boughner, Metcalfe street, is seriously ill at Toronto. Mr. Boughner left for there today.

A gallon of cider, with a head on it, was responsible for the flogging of William McVey of \$15 and costs this morning and the remaining of Selkirk still well for a few days, to determine if Selkirk can behave himself. If he fails by the way the magistrate is to give him a penitentiary sentence.

A farmer named Grabburg is also implicated in the disposal of the cider. Grabburg gave the apple juice to Stillwell, although Stillwell's wife warned Grabburg not to supply Selkirk with the jug of rotten pippins. The inspector was ordered to visit Grabburg's premises and ascertain if the stock he has on hand is within sober limits.

NO TRADING WHILE BOLSHIEVIKI ARE IN CONTROL OF RUSSIA
Fact Is More Political Than Economical, Is Hoover's View.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21.—Trade with Russia is more a political than an economical question, as long as Russia is controlled by the Bolsheviks, Secretary Hoover declared today in a statement discussing the problem of resumption of trade relations with Russia.

"Under their economic system," Mr. Hoover said, "no matter how much they moderate it in name, there can be no real return to production in Russia, and therefore Russia will have no considerable commodities to export and consequently no great ability to obtain imports."

"The whole question from a trade point of view develops into furnishing commodities equal to the gold, platinum and jewelry, variously estimated from \$50,000,000 to \$200,000,000 in the hands of the Bolshevik Government, and after that has been expended there can be little expectation of continued trade."

"There has been but little trade for gold, because its title has been called into question by the French Government, and by threats of private actions in the courts on the ground that it is stolen or subject to foreign liens. If any one European nation accepts the gold, no doubt all of them will."

"Europe cannot recover its economic stability until Russia returns to production. Trading for this parcel of gold would not effect this remedy—nor would the goods obtained by the Bolsheviks in return for it restore their production. That requires the abandonment of their present economic system."

STRATFORD CITIZENS REQUEST COUNCIL TO BUILD BOULEVARD

Suggest Important Improvement in Connection With Huron Street.

STRATFORD, March 21.—A deputation of property owners on Huron street, between Mornington and John streets, appeared before the city council tonight, requesting that in connection with the Huron street improvement a boulevard be built down the centre of the street, with a roadway on either side. The road is of sufficient width to accommodate such a scheme, which would greatly beautify the street.

The deputation will lay their suggestion in detail before the board of works at the next meeting.

Donated Trophy.
Interest in first aid work on the G. R. R. on the Stratford is being further aroused by the announcement that the transportation department officials have donated a trophy for competition among the transportation department teams.

No effort has thus far been made to revive the Citizens' Liberty League here for the local referendum vote. At the time of the last liquor vote the local league was quite active.

The Canadian Edison Appliance Company, which has been running with but a few hands, today announced an almost a full complement of hands. The officials are optimistic as to the future.

Jack Spencer, assistant superintendent of the Ontario employment service, met local employers of labor today and outlined what the Government is endeavoring to do for unemployment. He regretted that local employees had not taken fuller advantage of the service.

District Convention.
With a large attendance of delegates, the annual convention of the Stratford Sunday School Association was held here today. W. J. Blakeston presided. In the afternoon there were addresses by Rev. Dr. Webb of the Ontario Sunday School Board, Toronto, on "The Forward Movement in Our Churches," and by Rev. T. A. Halpeny of Toronto on "The Response Demanded From the Sunday School."

The reports from the officers and department secretaries recorded much activity. Department conferences preceded adjournment.

GALT TAXPAYERS PETITION AGAINST PROPOSED PAVEMENT
Action of Railway Board Being Awaited With Interest.

Construction of a permanent pavement on Water street north on the grounds of excessive cost, some of the residents have sent a petition to the Ontario railway and municipal board. The council plans to initiate the pavement, and the action of the railway board is watched with interest.

Because of the present unsettled conditions, the promoters of the scheme to give Preston a community hall have decided to defer action for a few months, hoping that by that time things will again be normal. However, learning a lesson from the success achieved in other cities and towns, Preston now proposes to organize an athletic association to control all sports in that town, and this action in view, a public meeting has been called for Thursday evening.

This evening at First Church a rally of the Waterloo County Presbyterian Union was held, with a large representation from all branches of young people's societies in the district. Rev. G. B. McLennan of Kitchener delivered a powerful address on "The Call to Young Canadians."
