Invalid Soldiers Home.

Among the invalid soldiers who
arrived at Quebec on Saturday from
overseas we observe the names of H.
Utman and E. McDonald, of Carleton
Place. The former is an Englishman
whose wife resides here, the latter is a
son of Mr. Allan McDonald, of town,
who enlisted in this west.

Traveller's Sudden Death.

Mr. N. S. Gaffield, the representative
of the wholesale firm of Gilmour & Co.,
Brockville, registered at the hotel at
Cobden a week ago yesterday, appar-
ently in his usual good health. He retired
to bed, but after awhile aroused a fellow
traveller in the next room, who called
the proprietor of the house, who in
turn secured the village doctor. Mr.
Gaffield was suffering an attack of acute
indigestion. The doctor administered
some medicine and apparently the
patient appeared to show signs of
improvement. The doctor went to his
office for a few minutes, but before he
returned Mr. Gaffield passed away. De-
ceased was well known up and down
the Valley, and was held in very high
esteem by all those who knew him,
especially by the business people whom
he had been calling upon for a great
many years.

Death of William Conner.

The death of Mr. William Conner
occurred somewhat unexpectedly yester-
day morning, at his home on Rochester
street. The deceased was 77 years of
age in June, and for some time had
been suffering from arterio-sclerosis,
but his collapse was not anticipated so
soon. The deceased was born at South
Lake, Leeds Co. He came to Carleton
from Seely's Bay about twelve years ago,
and has been a resident since. He was a
blacksmith by trade, but worked
little at his trade here, having invested
his means judiciously. He was a man
of staunch principles and very fixed in
his opinion. In religion he was a
Methodist. He was twice married, his
first wife, having died many years ago,
and is survived by two sons of the first
family, Dr. W. R. Conner, of Gouver-
neur, N.Y., and Geo. B. Conner, of Oak
Lake, Man. Fourteen years ago he
married Mrs. D. Robertson, who also
survives. The funeral is fixed for to-
morrow morning, when the service at
the house will be conducted by Rev. Mr.
Henderson, after which the remains
will be taken to the C.P.R. station, and
will leave by the 11 train for Brockville
and thence to Gananoque, interment to
be made in the Gananoque cemetery.
Dr. Conner is here for the obsequies.

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
