## THE NUGGET'S ELECTION.

The result of the Nugget's presidential election as published elsewhere in this paper, shows a complete landslide in favor of the Democratic candidate, William Jennings Bryan. This will undoubtedly prove a surprise to many people who have been under the impression all along that Dawson being the center of a gold mining camp, would naturally support the candidates who favor the maintenance of the gold standard. This supposition has proven entirely erroneous. If the American citizens in the Yukon territory had the right of naming the next president of the United States, his name would be Bryan, with 16 to 1 thrown into the bargain.

Whether the result of the Nugget's election is any indication of the turn affairs will take in the States remains yet to be seen.

There are reasons for belief that such will prove to be the case and then again it may be said, with justice, that it is impossible to judge the sentiment of the entire country by the trend of public opinion in a single locality.

The great majority of Americans now resident in the Klondike hail either from the coast or the mountain states. Four years ago these states, and more particularly Washington, Idaho, Montana and Colorado were practically unanimous in favor of Bryan. Whether they will go so strongly for the great silver apostle again, is a matter of uncertainty, but there is no discounting the fact that the men from those states have brought their convictions with them into the Klondike. We are quite satisfied that the Nugget's election has demonstrated their views with accuracy. Every opportunity was given for an open and free ballot, and the large number of votes polled serves to show that the contest, even though it will not affect the great battle which was waged on the outside yesterday, was entered into with a hearty spirit of earnestness.

The Nugget wishes at this time to extend its thanks to the many people, both Democrats and Republicans, who interested themselves in the election and who contributed to so great an extent toward making it the magnificent success it proved to be.

We had scarcely hoped in the beginning to poll one-third the number of votes which actually were cast, owing to the remote distances from Dawson, where many American citizens reside.

The intense interest manifested in the election overcame this difficulty, many men walking from long distances to secure an opportunity of voting. To the judges and clerks who kindly gave their services in making the count, special acknowledgement is due. The high standing in the community of all the gentlemen concerned is sufficient evidence of the fact that the count of ballots was absolutely fair and straight, with no room left for criticism of any kind.

We must also express our obligation to Mr. J. L. Sale for the perfect manner in which he has executed the beautiful souvenir, which will accompany

the certificate of election to Mr. Bryan. For beauty of design and workmanship we do not believe the trophy could be excelled.

Altogether the Nugget's presidential contest has been a most successful undertaking.

## CREEK NOTES.

Messrs. Lushbaugh and Hall, of 35 Eldorado, went to Dawson Monday making arrangements for provisions for the winter.

Mr. E. A. Leak, manager for Billy Leak on 31 Eldorado, was in Dawson looking after business matters last Tuesday.

No. 46 below Bonanza had a big dance on the 31st ult., being the first to use electric light on Bonanza creek.

Messrs. Arthur and Lord opened 66 below Bonanza roadhouse last Sunday. These gentlemen are wideawake business men, and are bound to make a success of their new enterprise.

T. T. Davis, of Monte Cristo, is putting in a big horizontal tubular boiler and will do business on a large scale this winter.

Mr. M. E. Olsen, of Sheppard and Olsen, on Orofino Hill, closed down Saturday for the winter. The above gentlemen hoist dirt from the deepest shaft in the country where pay is found. Mr. Olsen leaves for the outside in a few days to return again in January.

Pete Wiborg, of 33A Eldorado, has returned from Clear creek after an absence of two weeks. Mr. Wiborg says Clear creek is all right, and in time will show up as well as Bonanza. He has purchased a number of claims in that district, and declares that large sums have been offered for claims in the hundreds above discovery on the left fork.

The closing of the Yukon was the occasion of at least one celebration on Bonanza this season. Last Sunday being the day selected for the paying of the wager. Mr. and Mrs. Seebohm, of Orofino Hill, were the host and hostess. Promptly at 12 o'clock a big turkey dinner with cranberry sauce and all the delicacies of the season were served to the numerous friends and neighbors who gathered at the festive board. For two hours course after course was served, and when the jolly party finally broke up late in the afternoon it was to declare Mr. and Mrs. Seebohm among the best hosts and hostesses on the creeks.

Already teamsters are deserting the government road at various cutoffs, notably at 33 below Bonanza, 48 below Bonanza, and 57 below Bonanza. There still remain several others, and as soon as the roadhouse men at these places become ambitious enough to make the same passable, and draw all the trade their way these also will be used, making the distance between Dawson and the Forks not only considerably shorter, but avoiding several long grades.

A prominent business man was heard to say at the Forks the other day that the quartz find on Victoria would make the Forks a fine business place in the near future. He also made the statement that a large three-story building would be under construction at the Forks before Christmas. However this may be, it is confidently asserted by several shrewd business men of the Forks that more than one of the many places of business would be nil in the present bustling little burg before spring.

Work on the creeks is beginning to pick up since the recent cold snap, many of the miners having gone to work in the past week; still it will take more cold weather to allow work to go in many places. Mr. Holbrook, who has a plant at work on 56 below Bonanza, informs us that in a hole sunk by himself on the above claim, not a bit of frost was encountered, making it impossible to drift.

Another Aurora is to be opened to the public, this time, however, on the creeks, Jack Crowley having named his new roadhouse on Hunker Aurora No. 3. The location is at 55 below. Mrs. Buckley will conduct the establishment. All the good things demanded by the boys that hit the trails can be found there, as well as excellent accommodations for horses and dogs.
