Royal Highness, whose kindly and gracious sympathies, manifested upon so many occasions, have endeared her to all hearts, we humbly beg that you will personally convey to Her Majesty the declaration of our loyal attachment and of our determination to maintain firm and abiding our connection with the Great Empire over which she rules.

orable Mr. Scott, it was

Ordered, That the said Joint Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General on the part of this House by such Members thereof as are Members of the Privy Council.

The House, according to Order, was adjourned during pleasure, and again put into a Committee of the Whole on the Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the sale of "Intoxicating Liquors, and the issue of licenses therefor."

The second and remaining clauses of the Bill severally read and agreed to. Title again read and agreed to.

After some time the House was resumed, and

The Honorable Mr. Ferrier, from the said Committee, reported that they had gone through the said Bill and had directed him to report the same to the House without any amendment.

That the said Bill be now read a third time.

The Honorable Mr. Scott moved in amendment, seconded by the Honorable Mr.

Power,

That the said Bill be not now read a third time, but that its consideration be deferred until the question of the Jurisdiction over the issue of the licenses whether by the Federal Parliament or the Provincial Legislatures shall have been first decided.
