which had generated most of the Bears' good scoring chances. The Bears were outshot 40-28 and received five of eight minor penalties.

The same circumstances occurred on Saturday as the Dinos drilled 44 shots at goalie Dale Henwood while his teammates could only manage 25 at the Calgary net. Again the Bears

lacked sharpness, giving away the puck, and were forgetful on defense. But there must be credit given to Calgary who skated, checked, and shot well.

It was just not the Bears' day as far as breaks go either. Several times the puck would hop over stick, or a pass was off or an Alberta player was in the wrong place at the wrong time. An example of this is when Kevin Primeau broke through the Calgary defense but couldn't control the puck and lost his chance at a shot on net. Again the Bears played decently but were just that fraction off.

Dale Henwood turned in a sharp performance despite being scored on five times. He made some excellent saves but was victimized by three deflection goals and an erratic defense.

Calgary scored four of their five goals in the second period, two of them belonging to Rick Hindmarch. The last Calgary goal was typical of the Bears' luck. Frank Clarke was pushing

out a Calgary player in front of the net as a Calgary pass was coming out of the corner. The puck went off Clarke's skate and slowly slid past Henwood who was going the other way with the pass.

Leon Abbott said "we got beat, that's all," after Saturday's contest. Primeau commented, "We gave it to them today, we should have come out and taken it away.

Take it away they did on Sunday as they looked like the Bears of old. "This is the first time we've really jumped-on the puck since Christmas," Abbott told reporters. The Alberta team checked well and finally had their sharpness back.

The game, although Alberta controlled, was close after two frames with the score 3 all. Sluchinski had scored twice and John Rooney once for the Huskies with Clarke Jantzie scoring two and Rick Peterson one for Alberta. Jantzie's two goals gave him 6 goals in 5

In the third period the Bears struck for four goals. Primeau clicked first, followed by Ofrim, Andreassen, and Venance. Defenseman Frank Clarke had three assists in the game while forward Peterson and centre Hutchinson each assisted

Huskie netminder Doug Senyk was subjected to 38 shots and his teammates slapped only 12 at Craig Gunther. Both goalkeepers handled some difficult chances.

The Bears were harrassing the Huskies in their own end and for the first time in three games the Albertans had little trouble getting out of their defensive

There were 19 penalties in the game of which the home team took 9, including one misconduct and a fighting ejec-
