## Vaccines

Vaccines are not for kids only! We all need a TETANUS-DIPHTHERIA booster every ten years to maintain protection to these two dangerous diseases. MEASLES vaccine is also recommended to anyone born after 1956 who hasn't been previously vaccinated or hasn't had the disease (doctor-diagnosed). Young adults, especially males with no history of mumps or the live vaccine, should receive a MUMPS vaccine. RUBELLA (German Measles) vaccine is extremely important for all women of childbearing age.

Rubella, a mild childhood infection, can cause miscarriage and birth defects if contracted during pregnancy.

Homosexual men and drug addicts should discuss with their doctor the need for HEPATITIS B vaccine.

# Menzies to Speak

The Canadian Institute of International Affairs, will be presenting Retired Ambassador Arthur Menzies as the Guest Speaker on Oct. 29, at 8 pm in the St. Thomas Faculty lounge, 3rd floor of Edmund Casey Hall.

Menzies served for 42 years in the Department of External Affairs from 1940-1982, primarily concerned with Asia

and the Pacific as well as international security questions.

Born and educated in China, Menzies joined the Department of External Affairs in 1940, serving in the Far Eastern countries of Japan, Malaysia, Burma, Vietnam and China. He also served as High Commissioner in Australia and Fiji during the late 60's and early 70's.

On returning to Canada in 1980 he was appointed first Ambassador for Disarmament, a post he held until he retired in August 1982. Since his retirement, he has traveled extensively, lecturing and serving as a consultant.

On Oct. 29, Menzies will speak on Canada's Pacific Rim Neighbours: Old Societies with New Dynamism.
