

Yarmouth, Nova Scotia



Tourists who visit Yarmouth during the summer can hardly realize that their friends in Boston, a short 250 miles away, are experiencing a "hot wave" while they are enjoying delightful sea breezes, with the thermometer at about 75 degrees.

Leaving Central wharf, Boston, at 1.30 p. m., on one of the Boston & Yarmouth steel ocean-going steamers which sail daily, Saturday excepted, during the summer months, a short and healthful sea voyage of about sixteen hours will bring you in sight of Cape Forchu, at the

entrance to Yarmouth harbor, so named by De La Saussage on his way from Penobscot to France in 1613. After passing Yarmouth Light, the "Bug" and Markland, the steamer reaches her dock about 7 o'clock, a. m., where numerous hackmen are ready to convey the visitor to his destination, or, if one is undecided where to go, he can be directed to the Secretary of the Tourist Committee, who will be pleased to render any assistance he may require.
