## CHAPTER II.

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In the month of August, 1750, three hundred and fifty settlers arrived, in the ship Alderney; and in September following, three hundred German Protestants, from the Palitinate, in the ship The local authorities were embarrassed in Ann. providing for their support, and found it necessary to enter into pecuniary arrangements with the merchants of the town, who, at this early period, d formed themselves into an association for the senefit of trade. Those who came in the ship Alderney were sent to the opposite side of the perbour, and commenced the town of Dartmouth, which was laid out in the autumn of that year. In December following, the first forry was established, and John Connor appointed ferryman by order in Council.

In the following year the Indians surprised the little village at night, scalped a number of settlers and carried off several prisoners.
