of their own farms, may sell in any part of the city by the quarter, or greater quantity, after the hour of twelve o'clock noon, if they have paid the market fees, and been unable to dispose of their provisions in the regular market.

Sec. VII. That no person, other than a licensed butcher, or farmer disposing of the produce of his own farm, shall sell, or expose for sale, in any part of the city, or in the public markets, any fresh meat.

Sec. VIII. That no butcher, his servant, or agent, or any person in his behalf, shall, directly or indirectly, purchase, or cause to be purchased, from any farmer or other person, any meat or other article of provision offered for sale in the city, before the hour of twelve o'clock noon, for the purpose of selling the same again; nor shall any licensed butcher, &c., act as the servant or agent of any other individual in the purchase of any meat, &c., offered for sale in the city, before the hour aforesaid.

SEC. IX. That the sum of five shillings shall be paid for a license, by every person exercising the trade of a butcher, in the city.

SEC. X. That all persons selling meat, or articles of provision by weight or measure in the city, shall provide themselves with scales and weights, regularly marked, stamped, and duly adjusted by the inspector of weights and measures for the city, and all articles of provision sold by weight or measure, which shall be brought into the market, and shall prove deficient in weight or measure, shall be forfeited and seized for the use of the poor, and if sold, the seller shall be punished as hereafter provided.

SEC. XI. That no person when arriving under the arches or inside the market, shall drive faster than a walk.

SEC. XII. That horses, cattle, &c., shall be excluded from the interior of the market place, and the sidewalks surrounding the same outside, and horses and Oxen drawing waggons and other carriages into the market place, shall be immediately taken out of the same, until again wanted to draw off the said waggons and other carriages, and all persons frequenting the market with articles of provision or produce for sale, shall place their waggons, sleighs, and other carriages in such order, as the clerk of the market shall direct.

Sec. XIII. That all waggons, bringing firewood to the city for sale, shall be placed along the south side of Front-st, west of the Market Square, in a single line, with the horses heads towards the eastward, and each person bringing firewood to the city for sale, shall drive his horse or other animals drawing the same, close up to the rear of the last waggon, &c., and shall whenever a waggon &c., leaves the line before his waggon or other carriage close up the line again, and any person who shall neglect or refuse to comply with this law, or shall leave the line before he has
