Kingston, Nov. 19—An investigation by the Dominion Wreck Commission into the wreck of the steamer Turret Chief in the recent gale will be held in the City Council chamber Friday morning.

Two master mariners will likely sit with Capt. H. St. George Lind, say, The Canadian Lakes and Ocean Navigation Company, which owns the vessel, will be represented by Francis King of this city. This will be the first of a series of investigations into the wreck in the recent storm on the lakes.

The Turret Chief was a 100-ton tugboat, built in 1908, and was on its way from Kingston to Montreal when it was wrecked on the night of Nov. 18.

The vessel was carrying a cargo of coal and was the property of the Canadian Lakes and Ocean Navigation Company.
