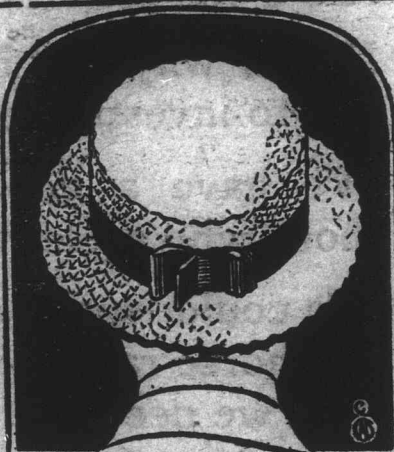

## BANK CLERK UNDER ARREST AT TRENTON

(Special to The Ontario.)

Trenton, June 15.—Basil R. Dulmage, a collection clerk of the Merchants Bank of Montreal was arrested here this morning upon information supplied by the Montreal authorities. He is charged with having embezzled \$150,000 of the bank's funds. The arrest was effected by Chief of Police Moffatt. He came to Trenton yesterday morning from Cobourg and was accompanied by a woman. They proceeded to the Gilbert house where they registered as J. L. Bell, and wife, Toronto.

It is now supposed that the woman is a decoy used by the Pinkerton Detective Agency, who had the case in hand.

The solicitor of the bank and another officer identified Dulmage here this morning. He will be taken to Montreal as soon as the proper officer arrives.

Dulmage's departure from Montreal took place about the last of March. The shortage in his account was afterwards discovered to be as stated above. \$1000 reward was offered for his apprehension and arrest. He is a young, nice-looking, unmarried man, and has been living with his mother at Montreal.

## DISASTROUS CONFLAGRATION AT WOOLER

(Special to The Ontario.)

Three Principal Buildings Burned Up Last Night.

Wooler, June 13, 1914.—This village was visited by a disastrous fire last night which brought heavy loss. About 11.30 the fire was first discovered in Lavery's general store. The flames had made such headway before being noticed that it was quite impossible to arrest their progress. In a few minutes the building with its valuable stock of merchandise was a heap of smouldering ruins. From the store the fire communicated itself to the town hall, and Mr. Gil Rutan's temperance house, and both these buildings speedily fell a prey to the flames, leaving in each case only the brick wall standing. We have not yet learned particulars as to the insurance carried, but the gross loss in each case will be approximately as follows: Lavery's store, building and contents.....\$8,000 Town hall and contents.....1,500 Rutan's hotel and contents.....2,500 Total \$12,000

The town hall was the property of the township of Murray. It is a substantial brick structure, but as the walls still remain standing the loss is somewhat ameliorated.
