Local News

THE PROBS

TORONTO, Aug. 27.—Showers have occurred again over the Lake Superior, otherwise the weather in Canada has been everywhere fine.

Light to moderate variable winds, generally fair and cool to-day and on Friday, but light showers in a few localities.

Recruits Parade To-night. The active service recruits of the 38th Dufferin Rifles will parade to-night at the armories. They will include all sworn men who were not included in the first contingent. The second contingent is now undergoing a stiff course of military training.

Raised Four Feet. Lorne Bridge is now four feet higher at the city end than it was hitherto and is resting upon a concrete foundation which has been built up. All the jacks have been taken out from under the end and work is now proceeding upon the centre pier at the bridge which is being heightened to support the structure in the middle. When this has been sufficiently raised the work of raising the end still higher will be gone on with.

Want to Go. There are one hundred and eighty Poles and Russians in this city who are clamoring to go to war, and every day they beseege Louis Stander and desire to know the method by which the would enlist and so strike a blow at the German enemy. He, however, is not sure that the men, although loyal and anxious to fight, would be accepted by the authorities. The men are fully determined to go to the front if there is any possible way of getting there.

Horses Purchased. Over fifty horses were on show at the far grounds this morning when the Government officers, Captain Raspberry of the C. A. V. C., and Sergeant Steward of the Artillery, inspected the animals with a view to purchase for the British war office. They looked over the specimens and after giving a few selected horses a stiff gallop, they purchased them.

There were not more than six horses taken over for the purpose of war. The animals bought will be shipped to-night to Valcartier and later transhipped to Great Britain.

QUICK WORK BY RUSSIANS WON VICTORY

Fate of Several Forts Sealed by Advance of Czar's Hosts.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 26, via London, Aug. 27, 6 to 10 a.m.—A Russian army order prohibits the use of food and forage, abandoned by the Germans in East Prussia because of cases of poisoning which have occurred at Eydtkuhnen, Gumbinnen and Insterburg. According to all accounts the Germans were taken by surprise by the rapidity of the Russian cavalry movements and the dash through the Mazur Lake district, where their five lines of defence were flanked. After the capture of Gumbinnen and Insterburg, which was strongest, the Angersburg line was taken without fighting. The swift Russian movement together with the crossing of the River Angerapp, and the successful battle northward toward Neidenburg, seals the fate of the central fortifications. Fort Boyen is now surrounded on all sides and passage through East Prussia is consequently quite open.

They Harass German Lines and Reduce Invading Forces.

ANTWERP, Aug. 26, via Paris, Aug. 27, 3 to 8 a.m.—It is officially announced that Belgian operations have been completely successful. They have the double object of reducing the German entrenchments and of drawing Germans from the line at Mechlin and Brussels, so as to relieve the pressure on the French positions. Four Belgian divisions from Namur stopped the German fourth division by obliging it to retrace its steps. The Belgian troops then retreated on the French line. The forts at Namur are still holding out.

British Cruiser

WINSTON SPENCER CHURCHILL, FIRST LORD OF THE ADMIRALTY, ANNOUNCED THE SINKING OF THE GERMAN WILHELM DER GROSSE IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS TO-DAY.

"THE ADMIRALTY HAS JUST RECEIVED INTELLIGENCE THAT THE GERMAN ARMED MERCHANT CRUISER KAISER WILHELM DER GROSSE, OF 14,000 TONS, AND ARMED WITH TEN 4-INCH GUNS, HAS BEEN SUNK BY H.M.S. HIGH FLYER OFF THE WEST COAST OF AFRICA.

"THIS IS THE VESSEL WHICH HAS BEEN INTERFERING WITH TRAFFIC BETWEEN THIS COUNTRY AND THE CAPE, AND IS ONE OF THE VERY FEW GERMAN ARMED AUXILIARY CRUISERS WHICH SUCCEEDED IN GETTING TO SEA. THE SURVIVORS WERE LANDED BEFORE THE VESSEL SANK. THE HIGH FLYER HAD ONE KILLED AND FIVE WOUNDED."

Made Inspection of the Railway

The Street Railway Commission inspected the Grand Valley Railway system yesterday and Engineer Jones, who was present upon the trip as consulting engineer, will tabulate and send in his report as the result of the commissioners' investigations.

The car bearing the party, which consists of the Commission composed of Mr. Hartman, chairman, Mr. Turnbull and Mr. K. V. Bunnell, the City Engineer hurriedly made his exit from the railway, left Brantford shortly after three o'clock and proceeded past Paris, almost to Galt. At intervals the car was stopped and the City Engineer hurriedly made his examination of the culverts and bridges erected by the company. It was found that the work was well and efficiently carried out and that the section men now at work south of Paris and north of Glenmorris, were doing splendid, solid work. The new ties were found to have arrived at Blue Lake and they will shortly be put into use for the bettering of track conditions along the route. The Commission was satisfied with the result of their investigations and Engineer Jones' report is now awaited.

SPY CAUSED DEFEAT

PARIS, Aug. 27.—A refugee from Merbes-Le-Chateau, a town 13 miles from Mons, said on his arrival here that 360 Belgian riflemen posted in his town, kept several thousand Germans at bay for three days until a German spy, disguised in a Belgian uniform, showed them a path which enabled the Germans to take the riflemen in their rear. All were killed except 12 villagers.

ALL FRANCE POLITICALLY IS UNITED

Socialists Join New Cabinet in Common Defence of Country.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]

PARIS, Aug. 27.—12.15 p.m.—The entry of Jules Guesde and Marcel Sembat, the former a Socialist and the latter a United Socialist deputy, to the leadership of the Socialists of France in succession to the late Jean Jaures, has unified the party and is favorably commented upon by all parties in France, and particularly the Socialists themselves.

M. Guesde and M. Sembat are also members of the new cabinet, will never depart without portfolio and the latter holding the post of minister of public works. The Socialists say they desire to collaborate in the defense of the nation, although under the leadership of M. Guesde, they all will be opposed to the participation of the party in the government.

M. Guesde, in an interview in the Paris Midi to-day, says: "I go into the cabinet as an envoy of my party, not to govern, but to fight. If I were younger, I would have shouldered a gun. But as my age does not permit this, I will nevertheless face the enemy and defend the cause of humanity."

"I am confident of final victory, and without hesitation as its subsequent role in France, the party will never deviate from the line of conduct laid out. As the solidarity of workmen does not shut out the right to defend themselves against the traitor workmen, so international solidarity does not exclude the right of one nation to defend itself against a government traitor to the peace of Europe."

"France has been attacked, and she will have no more ardent defenders than the workmen's party."

M. Sembat declined to say more than that he and M. Guesde had accepted their portfolios with the approval of the Socialist party, "which, with all other parties in France, must now give way before the necessity of national defence."

Trains Tied Up

French Authorities Forced to Assume Charge of All Railways.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The Daily Mail's Boulonnais correspondent says that the events of the past few days have again disorganized the Paris train service and that everything must give way to the necessities for the transportation of troops, the removal of wounded and the clearing of the civilian population, from the firing lines.

The train from Paris Wednesday took twelve hours, being compelled to wait seven hours at Amiens by a flood of 5,000 Belgian refugees arriving from the Charleroi district and a train load of British wounded who were guarded from inquisitive visitors by armed sentries.

SIR EDWARD GREY

Paid a Tribute To-day to German Ambassador at London.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]

LONDON, Aug. 27.—3.43 p.m.—The Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, paid a tribute to Prince Charles Max Lichnowsky, the former German ambassador to Great Britain, in the House of Commons this afternoon, saying that the diplomat had worked to the end for peace, but the real authority at Berlin did not rest with him or those like him.

Sir Edward reiterated that the Government decided on August 2 only the condition under which Great Britain could remain neutral. This was Germany's respect for the neutrality of Belgium. The Ambassador Lichnowsky had strongly urged the British Government to alter their decision, but the Foreign Secretary said that would have been impossible without England becoming a consenting party to the violation of a treaty and subsequently to a German invasion of Belgium.
