AMERICA'S ACTION IS AWAITED

It Will Set a Precedent For All Time.

London, June 5.—The Morning Post's naval correspondent in an article to-day discusses the situation existing between the United States and Germany as a result of Germany's submarine warfare.

"The action of the Germans in sinking merchant vessels without having previously sent a boarding officer on them," says the correspondent "is undoubtedly contrary to the law of nations. The issue between America and Germany therefore is reduced to the simple question whether neutral nations will permit such actions as Germany's to pass without appealing to the arbitration of war."

"In this respect the United States has in its keeping the present and future rights of all neutrals, for America is by far the most powerful among the neutral nations, almost all of which are suffering under the same wanton wrongs. The action of America in the present situation must inevitably establish a far-reaching precedent."

FINISHING TOUCHES

Washington, June 5.—President Wilson was to-day putting the finishing touches on his latest note to Gerlach, Paris, in the sinking of the Lusitania. It already had been approved in principle by the cabinet. All that was needed to-day to start the communication on its way to Berlin was the making of minor changes in phraseology.

The president was expected to complete the work of revision during the day. The note will then be sent to the state department for transmission by cable probably to-night or to-morrow to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin who will, in turn, present it to the German foreign office. Previous reports that the note would be brief but emphatic are borne out, it is said by the text as it now stands.

WILL NOT BE RECOGNIZED

Washington, June 5.—The British ambassador has forwarded to British consuls throughout the United States a warning that Great Britain in enforcing its naval prize rules, would not recognize transactions involving the offering of credits in neutral countries.



SKIRMISHES ONLY SO FAR YET

Italians Are Confident of Their Campaign.

Udine, Italy, June 4, via Paris, June 5.—The censorship established on the frontier prevents the names of officers in commands, the number of troops stationed on the different fronts and even the destination of regiments or companies to creep into news despatches. The censors, however allow news of the mobilization to be forwarded. It is now stated officially that the mobilization is complete and that all Italian soldiers occupy posts which Lieut-General Count Cadorna designated from his office in Rome.

Encounters with enemy thus far are regarded as merely outpost skirmishes, which however, are most significant since they invariably resulted in Italian successes allowing Italy to occupy advantageous positions in Austrian territory.

On both sides preparations are being made for a decisive action leading to a great battle, which, it is expected will occur within a fortnight or three weeks.

It is already evident that Austria's largest number of troops are centered in Friuli, but also offer bitter resistance in the province of Trent, where they are aided by strong fortifications, rendered more redoubtable by natural advantages of the mountainous region.

The Italian troops are firmly convinced that they will be victorious and give daily exhibitions of valor. The officers say that now they are merely testing the Austrians with the view of ascertaining their strength.
