CORRESPONDENT OF CHRONICLE TELLS OF BATTLE

Philip Gibbs Writes of Canadian Stand at Ypres.

ENEMY WAS BADLY PUNISHED

Canadian Dash Recovered Most of the Lost Ground.

From "The Daily Chronicle" Special Correspondent, Philip Gibbs, British Headquarters.

Saturday Night. After a period of intense bombardments on various parts of our line—especially in the Souchez sector—during the past week, the enemy developed an important attack yesterday upon our trenches from Hooge to the neighborhood of Hill 60, a distance of about 3,000 yards, held by the Canadians, and succeeded in taking temporary possession of considerable portions of this frontage.

Throughout the night heavy firing was continuous, the Germans seeking to consolidate the positions they had occupied on the previous day. The hostile artillery barrage was very severe, and our artillery maintained a heavy bombardment.

During the course of this morning the Canadians launched a counter-attack and gained a lodgment at several places in the trenches occupied by the enemy. Fierce bombing and hand-to-hand fighting were in progress, and at the time of writing it is understood that nearly the whole of the positions have been retaken.

Great Gun Duel. It was about 9.15 yesterday morning that the enemy concentrated their artillery fire upon the sector. They used guns of every calibre, and not only poured high explosives and shrapnel upon the front line trenches, but put up a formidable barrage behind, and shelled the roads in the neighborhood in a systematic way.

Our artillery retaliated and one of the greatest duels of gun-fire that has been seen on our front for some time lasted for several hours.

The enemy's fire lifted at about mid-day yesterday, and his infantry made a strong attack upon the front-line trenches, which had been very severely damaged. It seems that about nine German battalions took part in the assault, and it is certain that they suffered severely from the resistance of the Canadians, who, in spite of the effects of the bombardment fought very fiercely before the enemy was able to enter their trenches.

Owing to the continuous shell fire, a considerable portion of our line had to be abandoned for a while, and the Canadians fell back to the south-west of Hooge upon a line running through Sanctuary Wood toward Hill 60, from which they made sorties during the night and engaged in bombing attacks with the utmost vigor.

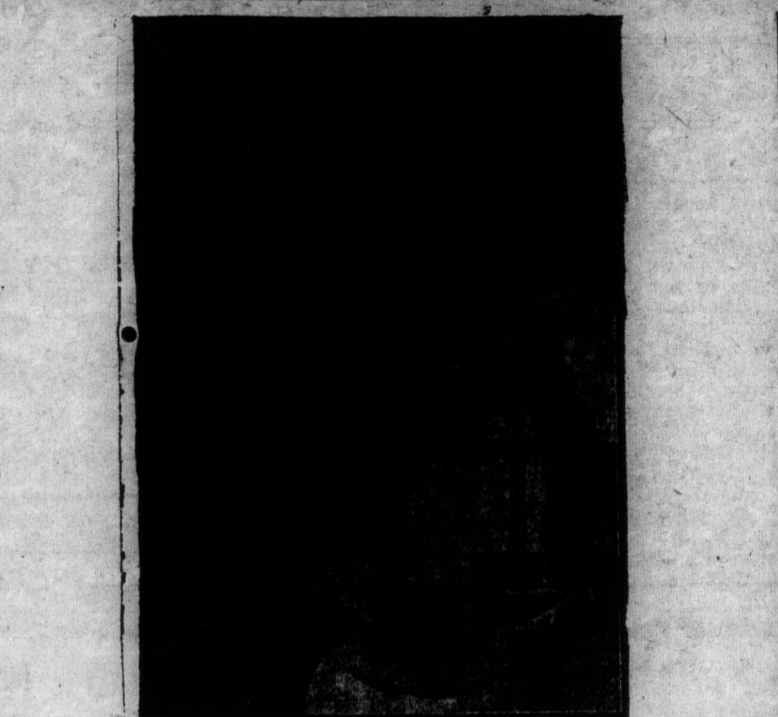
Splendid Work of R.E. No further attack or attempt to advance was made by the enemy, but the bombardment on each side continued intensely. It is told that the gun fire during the attacks and counter attacks at St. Eloi, in which the Canadians were also engaged, was but "child's play" to this in the neighborhood of Hooge, although at the time it seemed of the greatest violence.

All ranks and branches of the Forces engaged behaved with the utmost devotion to duty, and desperate gallantry was shown by the R.E.'s and "Signals," who endeavored to maintain communications. The gunners had no rest and poured out unceasing fire from their batteries, so that the enemy received a terrible punishment. Heaps of German dead were found in Sanctuary Wood today, and in our old line of trenches.

Cheers of Advancing Canadians. The counter attack was delivered today and was launched in full daylight, shortly after half-past seven in the morning. Canadian troops advanced, cheering as they ran, and attacked in assaulting parties at various points of the line. The side of the captured line were quickly retaken, and the assaulting columns penetrated at each point of attack on the rest of the front with

STRIKE ON THE G. T. R. AND WABASH ROADS

Car Checkers and Clerks Out and Traffic Over International Bridge Halted. By special Wire to the Courier. Buffalo, N.Y., June 21—Freight traffic on the Grand Trunk and Wabash railroads, over the International Bridge, is practically at a standstill to-day as the result of a strike of 71 of the 79 clerks and car checkers in the Grand Trunk-Wabash offices at Black Rock and in the Bridgeburg, Ontario, yard. The clerks demand wage increases averaging 12 1/2 per cent. Local officials of the roads are working in the freight offices in an effort to keep the perishable or fast freight moving. Heavy clerical work involved in shipments across the international boundary makes the strike a serious one.

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HUGE CLAIMS PAID BY LIFE INSURANCE COS.

In Canada and United States Total For 1915 is Over 700 Millions.

By Special Wire to the Courier. New York, June 21—Life insurance organizations in Canada and United States paid out a total of \$733,700,000 during the year 1915, according to an official estimate published today in The Insurance Press. This amount was paid by 220 regular companies and was divided into \$451,300,000 in death claims, maturing and annuities and other benefits, and \$282,400,000 in premium savings, cash value of surrendered policies and to beneficiaries under policies issued in foreign countries.

The mortality among European policyholders, the report says, was very little, if any, in excess of the normal mortality under peace conditions.

Man Charged With Trying to Blow Up Welland Canal, Remanded.
