## ABERDEEN'S ARRIVAL

Our New Governor-General is Now on Canadian Soil.  
HE IS SWORN IN AT QUEBEC.

Brings a Large Staff to Help Him Govern the Country.—The New Viceregal Party Welcomed by a Number of Front-line Canadian.

QUEBEC, Sept. 18.—The Allan line steamship *Sardinian*, with Lord and Lady Aberdeen on board, arrived at Quebec at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and moored at Princess Louise embankment. The weather, which has been so far so good, was continued to be cold and rainy, so that at nine o'clock there were very few onlookers to witness the Aberdeen's official landing on Canadian soil.

There was a busy scene on the docks of the Sardinian. His Excellency's people were getting luggage of all kinds ready to be landed, whilst gangs of laborers were piling under shelter on the pier the passenger's baggage.

At a quarter to nine o'clock a company of the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars, under command of Lieut. Baldwin, arrived on the pier.

**THE FIRE KING.**

Forest fires have made a clean sweep of the 20 miles between Rabook and Neeshab, Wisconsin.

Two daughters, aged 5 and 8 years, perished in the burning of James Johnson's house at Alvinston, Ont.

Forest fires have done great damage in the vicinity of Deadwood, S. D. Central City is believed to be in danger.

The Masonic buildings at Alvinston, including the office of the Free Press, were destroyed by fire yesterday morning.

An increase in rates of from 10 to 50 per cent was ordered by the Milwaukee board of underwriters because of heavy losses.

Forest fires are doing terrible damage in Marshall county, Wisconsin. Many farmers have been burned out of homes and homes.

Terrific forest fires are raging around Marshall, Wis. A number of lively families have been lost and forty families are homeless.

J. F. Snyder has been arrested by government officers at Spokane charged with setting fires which destroyed 1,000 acres of timber. Other arrests will follow.

The new City Hall at Spokane, Wash., was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon. Three timers were at work on the building and they are reported to have been burned to death.

The home of Milton Myers, near Milwaukee, Wis., was burned Thursday night, and three of his children were killed. Mrs. Myers jumped from a window with an infant in her arms, and both were seriously injured.

**CANADIAN POLITICS.**

The citizens of St. John, N. B., by a vote of 2,155 to 704 decided to reduce the number of aldermen in that city from 26 to 15.

The United States Geodetic survey steamer *Hessler* and *Patterson* have arrived at San Francisco from Alaska and report that the boundary dispute with Canada is as far as ever from settlement, and that the surveying party is continuing its work to the correct one. The officers think arbitration will be necessary.

## ANOTHER OKLAHOMA

Bank for Land in the Cherokee Strip—ARKANSAS CITY, Ark., Sept. 18.—At 12 o'clock on Saturday the bars that have so long enclosed 1,600,000 acres of public land were let down, and over a hundred thousand men and women joined in a mad rush for land. Men who had the fastest horses rode like mad from the border only to find other men with sorry looking animals ahead of them.

Fed teams, carrying anxious homeseekers, were driven at breakneck speed only to find men on the land, who had taken to keep the sooner element out, and yet that same element, profiting by former experience, had captured the land. All the rumble of teams could be heard as they moved out to the strip. At the depot the men stood at the ticket office awaiting the slow movements of the ticket-sellers, who could not get over 5,000 tickets an hour. The great jam, however, was at Okmulgee, where there gathered 30,000 citizens all anxious for their ten-mile race. As Meridian an hour start was made. For an hour before the horses and men.

The registration books at Okmulgee were robbed of certificates and the official stamp and thousands of forgeries are on the market.

**Used His Money Well.**

During his life-time he distributed fully \$1,000,000 in assisting charitable objects, in building churches, supporting religious societies, institutions of learning, and in effecting public improvements in the town of New Rochelle. He spent over \$500,000 in making good, for an hour before the horses and men.

Recovered a Hundred Thousand.—WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 18.—It is stated that the Treasury Department that Henry S. Cochrane, the weigh clerk of the Philadelphia Mint, had sole custody of the \$184,000 worth of gold bullion which has been reported missing. Circumstances in the case are such that Cochrane knew what became of the bullion and he was charged with its embezzlement, and finally admitted it. He was ordered to return the bullion to where over \$100,000 of it was secreted and it was recovered yesterday.

**A Big Railway Scheme.**

New York, Sept. 18.—Special Agent at Havertill, Mass., says: A vast scheme is afoot in regard to the entire electric road system of New England. The plan is to place the control of one syndicate.

The scheme is not only to consolidate the various roads, but to build a trunk line that will connect the principal cities of Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

**A Big Labor Organization.**

Pittsburgh, Pa., Sept. 18.—Pittsburgh labor leaders will the week organization of the United States on the subject of a labor union which will embrace within its ranks every association and union of workmen in the country. **Settled in the Custom House.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—In the custom house yesterday one hundred times of opium were found concealed under a coat seat. This is the first instance of a seizure within the custom house.

**Telegraphic Ticks.**

M. B. Scanlon, a commercial traveller, was perhaps fatally wounded by footpads at Niagara Falls, N. Y.
