HE NAILS ALD. LIDDY

Ex-Fireman Taylor Says John's
Circular Proves Him to be a
False Promiser.

"Ald. Liddy doesn't hinge his state-
ments on truth or keep his promises,"
said ex-Fireman Thomas Taylor this
morning. "His campaign sheet just
shows up the kind of a man John
Liddy is. The facts of the case as far
as I am concerned are simply these:
Ald. Liddy, and I were at Logger-
heads over the first appointment,
when both Alex. Holmes and I were
candidates and Mr. Holmes got the
situation. When the second vacancy
occurred, I was angry with Mr. Liddy
and didn't go near him. But he
stopped me at Northway's corner and
freely offered me his support. The
campaign sheet to which Ald. Liddy
has affixed his signature just shows
what kind of a man he is. In it he
boldly asserts that he supported Hype
Wanegarden, this, too, after he had
promised me his support and when-
ever I don't need to say to whom
these are the facts, and I leave the
public to judge from them. There is
another thing I would like to call at-
tention to. Ald. George Stephens,
when he was running for councillor,
promised to support me if I should
again be an applicant for a situation
at the fire hall. He again promised
when the vacancy occurred to support
me; but, mind you, when my applica-
tion was read at the council, Ald. Steph-
ens never said a word. Mayor
Smith was a man of a different
stamp. He told me that he wouldn't
support me because he had already
promised John Jones. He didn't sup-
port me, and I respected Mayor Smith
the more for it because he stuck to
his promise, and as a result, I have
confidence on him. Of course, I felt
sore at the Mayor at the time, we
both being Oddfellows, and he having
promised an outsider; but, when
thought over the conduct of Ald. Liddy
and Stephens, I admired Mr. Smith for his
action."

Rev. Dr. Daniels one of the most eloquent

The rails on the Lake Erie & De-
troit River Railway on the extension
between Ridgetown and Dutton, are
being laid, and the line will be open
to traffic by the last of December.
The grading of the remainder of the
line from Dutton to St. Thomas will
be finished this fall.

to the presence of the Liberal leaders, Geo.
Stephens had the most money opposite his
name but this was nothing to him. The

Smith amid cheers. Everybody except a
stranger within the gates was yelling for
Smith.

OUT AT BRIDGE END.
The Liberals held a well-attended
meeting in the school house at Bridge
End last evening. Mr. Palmer, a
neighboring farmer, occupied the
chair. N. H. Stevens was the first
speaker. He spoke on the corn ques-
tion, the grain tester, preferential
trade and the Intercolonial railroad.
Dr. Fleming devoted some time in
speaking about the Canadian contin-
gent and trade questions generally.
Water Thresher followed on the line
of Dr. Fleming's remarks. W. E. Gun-
dy of Ridgetown, also made a lengthy
speech. Ald. Stephens arrived from
Guilford where he had addressed a meet-
ing and entered amid applause. He
made one of the best speeches of his
campaign, and the meeting broke up
with cheers for the Queen, Laurier,
Stephens and Smith. There were
quite a number of Conservatives pres-
ent and they gave a good live telling
cheer for T. A.

LIVELY TIME IN BUXTON.

At North Buxton a political cake
contest was inaugurated last night un-
der the auspices of the Methodist Epis-
copal church. Mr. Garret occupied
the chair and Bishop Wilmore, Ald.
McGee, O. L. Lewis and J. G. Kerr
spoke in support of the Liberal candi-
dature, while C. A. Williams and
Wm. Shadd upheld the Conservative
cause. While Mr. Kerr was speaking
however, a Conservative delegation
arrived and the enthusiasm there
played carried away the meeting and
it closed with rousing cheers for T.
A. Smith. At the cake contest which
followed, however, the Stephens' fi-
nanciers won out with a majority of
304 to 151. They blew their money
freely and were bound to win at any
price.
