HINTS FOR THE HOSTESS.

Entertaining the Unexpected Male Guest at Mealtime.

It often happens that a woman will have an unexpected male guest at mealtime. I have found through long experience that men are more easily entertained than women. If the table be ordinarily neat, the meal plentiful and above all the welcome cordial the average man will not notice the absence of the best china nor the darn in the tablecloth.

To insure a plentiful meal have a plentiful supply of such things in the house as will keep well and can be cooked at a moment's notice. With the proper stores on hand it is an easy task to prepare a palatable soup, cook some ham and eggs and make an extra cup of coffee. If the cloth be not spotless spread a fresh napkin at the place of the guest, fill the saltcellar neatly, see that he has a dainty cup and saucer, and, believe me, he will carry away with him the memory of a pleasant repast if the hostess be at her ease and does not make him feel by her worried manner that his visit is an intrusion.

It sometimes happens that the head of the house is an unexpected guest when he comes to share a meal which he is not in the habit of taking at home. In that case he should not be greeted with "Oh, dear, I have nothing for you to eat; we had a cold lunch today," but the wife should make quietly and cheerfully the preparations she would make if a stranger had called. The husband will appreciate her action. A little thing like this may form another link in the chain which binds him to his home.—New Idea.

MILK SHERBET.

A Delicious and Inexpensive Dessert For Any Season.

In our house milk sherbet is the most popular dessert on the hottest day of summer or the coldest day of winter. To make it you take one quart of rich milk, three lemons, three-fourths of a pint of granulated sugar and one tablespoonful of granulated white gelatin.

Put the gelatin to soak in half a cupful of the cold milk, putting the remainder of the milk to boil in a farina boiler with half the sugar. Stir well. When it boils add the soaked gelatin, remove from the fire and stir until all is thoroughly dissolved. Strain into the ice cream can; put away to cool.

While it cools prepare the flavoring thus: Wash the lemons well, dry them, grate the rind of one and squeeze the juice of three in a dish, add the remaining half of the sugar, stir and mix thoroughly; stand in a cool place until needed.

Pack the tub in which the freezer is placed in the regular way with very finely broken ice and coarse salt. Pour the lemon and sugar into the prepared milk. Cover and freeze in the ordinary way, which will take from fifteen to twenty minutes. Remove the dasher, pack away and give at least one hour to ripen before using. If these directions are followed exactly the result will be most satisfactory, producing a delicious and inexpensive dessert for five or six persons.—Table Talk.

CULINARY CONCEITS.

In blending flour and water for thickening, if a fork is used, it will not lump.

A little lemon juice added to the water for mixing pastry improves the flavor and helps to make it light.

If you wish a cake to be light put it into a very hot oven at first and let the oven cool after the first twenty minutes.

For every use to which brandy is ordinarily put in cooking boiled cider is just as good. Boiled sweet cider till reduced to one-fourth its original volume.

Bones for soup should be chopped quite small and the stock in which they are put allowed to simmer only, never to actually boil, if you want to extract all the goodness.

A scant half cupful of strained tomatoes placed on the pan where lamb or mutton is roasting greatly improves the flavor of the meat. The tomato of course is used in the basting.

A Dainty Hash.

A sublimated sort of hash which deserves a more euphonious name is prepared very quickly and easily. Cold meat of any kind is put through the chopper, care being taken to eliminate gristle, etc. To this are added mashed potatoes in the proportion of one-third, half the quantity of canned tomatoes, a very small portion of grated onion and pepper and salt to taste. Cover the bottom and sides of a baking dish with cracker crumbs, put in the hash, strew more crumbs upon the top and let it bake gently for fifteen minutes. Can be used either hot or cold.

To Polish Linoleum.

Beeswax and turpentine polish for linoleum is hard to beat as far as its appearance is concerned, but it has one defect. It causes slipperiness, which may be very dangerous to children and old people. A polish which has no such objection is made of equal parts of linseed oil and vinegar. Apply a little to a flannel cloth, rub it well on the linoleum and polish with a clean, dry cloth.

It is a common thing to deprecate a woman for being what is called in common parlance "a matchmaker," but if she possesses the necessary qualifications of discretion and tact she is an almost indispensable adjunct to social intercourse and may prove the greatest boon to lovers who lack time and opportunity to bring their affections to a successful issue.
