SUPREME COURT OF CANADA WILL DECIDE SUCCESSION DUTY

Appeal Court Held Province Entitled to Collect on Mortgages Held Here.

\$3,000 INVOLVED IN APPEAL CASE

Case to Be Argued Within a Week Before Supreme Court of Canada.

E. Allison MacKay and J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., left last evening for Ottawa where they will represent the province in the case of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer vs. the Royal Trust Co. Ltd., executors of the estate of the late Anna M. Ferguson of Chicago, before the Supreme Court of Canada.

This is an action which was heard by the New Brunswick Appeal Court where it was decided that the province was entitled to succession duties on mortgages held by the estate on properties located within the province. The action was originally brought to force collection of some \$3,000 under the Succession Duties Act. Payment was refused and the case taken into court where the province was awarded a verdict. The case was then appealed by Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., on behalf of the defendant company. The appeal was, however, dismissed with costs by the Appeal Court of New Brunswick recently.

The defendant company is pressing the appeal farther and it will probably come before the Supreme Court of Canada within a week. Dr. Taylor will represent the appellant company at Ottawa; it is understood.
